This month we will celebrate Pentecost, the birth of the Church. Jesus' followers received the gift of the Holy Spirit and were empowered to spread the good news of God-in-Christ, which led to 3,000 people becoming Christians in a single day. In the liturgical year Trinity Sunday follows Pentecost and is a day that honours the Trinity (Father, Son, and Holy Spirit). For centuries the concept of one God in three persons has exercised most Christians. Church history is littered with different views:

For example...

Father, Son and Holy Spirit are different modes of God's self-revelation. God is the Father in creation, the Son in redemption, and the Spirit in sanctification. In other words, God exists as Father, Son and Spirit in different eras. This heresy is called Modalism and does not accept that Father, Son, and Spirit exist at the same time in every time.

Or...

Father, Son and Spirit are not distinctive persons, either Christ is not fully God, or the Father, the Son, and the Spirit are the same person in different 'modes'. This heresy is called Monarchism.

Then again...

Father, Son and Holy Spirit are three independent divine beings, three separate gods, who share the 'same substance'. This heresy is called Tritheism.

In the fourth century the most prevalent heresy was Arianism. One of its beliefs was that the pre-existent Christ was the first and greatest of God's creatures but was not fully divine. The controversy created by this teaching led to the Church affirming its belief in the Trinity through the formal statement of the <u>Nicene Creed</u> in 325 A.D. In this way the Church dogmatically affirmed what was already believed in the earliest of Christian theology.

We worship the one and only God who exists eternally in three distinct persons, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit – blessed Trinity! May we each be open to God revealing more of God's self to us as we seek to become more like Christ.

Other church officers will be confirmed by the Church Council at its next meeting on 3^{rd} June.

Janet Smith told the meeting that there will be a 'cleaning day' on Saturday 16th August. This will give us an opportunity to do a general clean and tidy-up around the building, She also drew our attention to the 'faults book' which is located in the church foyer. Anyone finding faults around the building should note them in this book so that they can be addressed.

Collecting boxes will soon be placed in the foyer for donations of food items to the Ealing FoodBank. Sue Barton, who is volunteering with the FoodBank said she would keep us advised on the items required by the FoodBank – at present they have a surplus of baked beans, pasta and

tinned tomatoes, but are short on items such as coffee and instant mashed potato. The requirement will change every month and details will be included in our weekly News-sheet.

On Saturday 12th July from 12 noon, the Northfield Avenue Traders Association is organising a 'Funday'. The meeting agreed that our church should be open for the afternoon.

Gerald Barton gave a brief presentation about the church 'AwayDay' on 5th April. It was agreed that we should hold another 'AwayDay' next year. Outline proposals for the day will be put to the next Church Council. Chrissie Howe thanked all those involved in organising the day for their efforts.

During the 'AwayDay' our facilitator, Wendy Beard had asked if we had had a service to celebrate completion of the redevelopment project. As we have not, the meeting agreed that we should do so and should celebrate its completion during morning worship one Sunday during the Autumn. This will be fed into the process for drawing together the Quarterly Preaching Plan.

Finally, the meeting agreed that the Sunday evening Bible study series that had been run by the Circuit had been very valuable and hoped that there would be further series in the future. The meeting closed with the sharing of the Grace.

Kingsdown's AwayDay

There was a sense of a "day at the seaside" as we met early on a Saturday morning, and boarded the coach which would take us to St. Katharine's Foundation in the East End. The sun was shining; we chatted and enjoyed the drive to St. Katharine's, thankful that we did not have to negotiate the London traffic.

St. Katharine's was founded in 1147 by Queen Matilda as a medieval hospital for poor infirm people, next to the Tower of London. In 1273, after a dispute over its control. Queen Eleanor granted a new Charter, reserving the Foundation's patronage to the Queens of England. For 678 years the Foundation carried on its work in East London, despite periodic difficulties and renewal. In 1825 commercial pressure (nothing new!) for larger docks caused the Foundation to be ejected, together with some 3,000 local inhabitants. The Foundation moved to Regents Park and became a residential almshouse for 125 years.

In 1948 St. Katharine's returned to the East London to its present location in Limehouse, a mile from its original location, and became a retreat house. The Royal Foundation is a charity, just minutes from the City and Canary Wharf and provides an unparalleled sense of peaceful seclusion as a venue for residential or daytime meetings; conferences; away days; retreats and overnight accommodation.

TRULY A HIDDEN URBAN OASIS

After our coffee we then gathered in a light, pleasant room, overlooking the garden to start the day's events. Discussions took place within smaller groups on our view of Kingsdown; our hopes and aspirations for the future both within the Church and also in the local community. There was a positive feedback on many issues, the friendships formed, the resounding hymns, coffee mornings, book sales, Boys' Brigade, Tuesday Club, Wednesday's Toddlers and Babies, Sunday School, and for many the location.

These were positive comments and ones that we should be proud of, but on the flip side there was an almost unanimous view that the Redevelopment Programme, over many years, had had a derogatory effect on morale and peoples' desire to move forward.

Of course the aesthetics of the new build, with all its advantages were appreciated, but there seemed to be a consensus of opinion that we had become stuck in time.

After lunch we continued to discuss ways forward; how to encourage more young people to become involved and become a vibrant, forward looking Church.

The whole group interacted well, and our Leader, Wendy Beard, very ably pulled together all the views and opinions that we had discussed during the day, both within the large and smaller groups.

In summing up she suggested that if we were to regain our sense of a "whole" Church, we should "put the past behind us, be thankful for all the work that had been done, all the fund raising and the commitment by so many and look to the future. A new day dawning......which I felt was a marvellous way to end what had been a new day in every sense.

The Kingsdown AV Project

It was some 13 years ago that the first draft ideas for upgrading the sound system and adding a projector were noted down. With the passing of time the project list got updated several times, still without any definite target date for its implementation.

Last November this all changed - funds were donated that have now made it possible for Kingsdown to have a very up to date Audio and Visual system that should last for many years without any cost to the Church funds.

The engineer working on the system remembered installing the outgoing amplifier in 1979!! The system now provides for the projection of PowerPoint or other similar presentations, DVD's and output from 'tablets' or 'ipads'. If the presenter wishes to control the programme then connections can easily be made in the Chancel through small traps in the floor.

For optimisation of speech the old column speakers were retained but for music a new pair of full range speakers were installed. Those who need to use hearing aids are supported by a separate induction loop system ('T' setting) which includes both speech and music and a separate microphone to pick up the sounds from the congregation. All can be relayed to the Upper Room and Foyer with local control.

Four new radio mics - two tie clips for presenters and two hand held's for the children and roving use support the Lectern, Pulpit and two other wired mics on the Chancel. New CD and DVD players plus a laptop PC will allow for a variety of uses to be covered including, when required, the projection of hymn words and bible readings.

Drums of power, audio, video and signal cables have disappeared along the skirting and under the Chancel floor. Many new power points have been installed to provide the connections to all the equipment required.

Part of the new system is the new Lectern which can be raised or lowered to suit the presenters height complete with its own video monitor mimicking the projected image. The pulpit has a similar monitor.

Control of the systems and housing for all the equipment is in a custom built desk that matches the other church woodwork..

Bringing it all together was a challenge but overall it was an interesting project to work on, that would have been much harder without the support of a small team of very knowledgeable guys who literally worked above the ceiling and under the church floor.

The project included installing some additional lights to brighten up the overall Altar area and, by using LED's, lamp replacement should not be required for several years.

Now we need a small team of 'Operators' who want to get involved in 'AV' and can develop the way the facilities are used to support the activities in the Church.

The donated funds include some provision for the small occasional maintenance that might be required so Kingsdown can enjoy the AV system for a long time to come at nil cost.

Philippines Typhoon

Typhoon Haiyan: Six months on

When Typhoon Haiyan struck the Philippines on 8 November 2013, images of pain and devastation streamed onto our TV screens. Over 14 million people were affected, and six months on, All We Can and our partners are still helping communities to rebuild their lives. Initial response

In emergencies, **All We Can,** responds quickly by working through local partners already present and rooted in affected communities. In response to the typhoon, we supported the immediate relief activities of the United Methodist Committee on Relief (UMCOR), and ACT partner the National Council of Churches in the Philippines (NCCP). These provided vital supplies such as food, bedding, kitchen utensils and hygiene kits to some of the most affected communities.

Listening to communities

Six months after Typhoon Haiyan, a recent UNOCHA report states that more than 2 million people in the Philippines are still living without adequate or durable shelter.

In response, **All We Can**, working in partnership with the Dutch Christian organisation Woord en Daad, is supporting local NGO Ang Mananampalatayang Gumagawa Philippines (AMG) to build temporary housing for displaced people in Giporlos municipality in the Eastern Samar region of the Philippines.

We believe it is vital to consult and listen to affected communities when seeking to meet their needs. The design of the shelters was drawn up with input from local construction engineers and the local mayor and a prototype model was then built. The shelter was then evaluated with the community to check it met their needs and in order to further optimise the design.

The whole community is now involved in the production of the homes, from sourcing and preparing locally building available materials, to building the homes after receiving training from AMG



How your donations helped

All We Can's supporters have donated over £350,000 to our appeal launched in response to Typhoon Haiyan. By working closely with four partners on the ground, this has enabled us to deliver support to those most in need in the Philippines, including:

Survival kits, food and essential supplies for 20,000 households Fishing boats and nets to enable 500 families to rebuild their livelihoods Providing 4300 grieving families with access to counseling to help them cope with the loss of loved ones, significant trauma and physical injuries

Materials and training to enable 2700 families to rebuild their homes.

HISTORY OF HANWELL METHODIST CHURCH

In 1881, when Hanwell was still a village, a Mr. Joseph Blackall started a "Society Class" in his home in Uxbridge Road. By 1882 there was a Sunday School of 18 and premises at 6 Brook Villas, Boston Road were rented, but by 1883, the Church needed to move again. These frequent moves were unsatisfactory and in 1884 a chapel was opened in Lower Boston Road.

The Wesley Guild, which later proved so important in the life of the Church, was started in 1887, followed by the Slate club in 1902 – both organisations continuing until around 1960.

In 1904, the Church moved to its present site in Church Road, where on November 9th, the President of the Conference conducted the Dedicatory Service of Hanwell Methodist Chapel.

To enhance the worship, a "Bell" organ was purchased, being replaced in 1912 by the present instrument. As well as Junior and Senior class meetings, there was a Band of Hope, a Ladies' Working Meeting and a thriving Sunday School. The Church built a good musical tradition and during the 1920's and 1930's, the Junior Choir won many competitions.

Always ready for an opportunity for spreading the Gospel, between 1911 and 1914 the Church held open-air services each Sunday evening in Hanwell Broadway and between 1908 and 1914 rented a cottage in Wilmot Place, Hanwell, for evangelisation and welfare work amongst the poor in the slums of The Slip'. During the War, Scout and Guide groups were started.

Between the wars, the work of proclaiming the Gospel continued. Around 1924 services were started in a hut in rural Greenford and later in 1928, services were held in the Parish Hall, Northolt. Even later in 1937, a Sunday School (which became North Hanwell Baptist Church) was started on the Cuckoo Estate.

A large fire in 1952 destroyed the "temporary" huts erected in 1922, but, in faith, the Church embarked on an ambitious building programme. These new premises are to-day well used by community groups as well as our own organisations.

Although to-day's congregation is much smaller than in the early days, and the pattern of Church life has greatly changed, Hanwell Church is upheld by the firm foundations, both spiritual and actual, laid by our predecessors looking forward to whatever God has in store.

In the autumn of 1996 the Methodist Church in England undertook a major re-structuring. As part of this process the Ealing and Acton Circuit decided to review its position and to make plans for the future. What was put together, headed by Colin Pratt was only ever done in a draft form, so there may well be inaccuracies, but perhaps this bit of history will prove to be interesting and helpful.

8 June Day of Pentecost - Whit Sunday

Pentecost took place on the well-established Jewish festival of Firstfruits, which was observed at the beginning of the wheat harvest. It was exactly 50 days after the Passover, the time of Jesus' crucifixion.

A feast day to celebrate the country's wheat harvest does not sound exactly world-changing, but that year, it became one of the most important days in world history. For Pentecost was the day that Jesus sent the Holy Spirit - the day the Church was born.

Jesus had told his apostles that something big was going to happen, and that they were to wait for it in Jerusalem, instead of returning to Galilee. Jesus had plans for his apostles – but he knew they could not do the work themselves – they would need his help.

And so the apostles and disciples waited in Jerusalem, praying together for several days. And then on that fateful morning there was suddenly the sound as of a mighty rushing wind. Tongues of flame flickered on their heads, and they began to praise God in many tongues – to the astonishment of those who heard them. The curse of Babel (Genesis 11: 1- 9) was dramatically reversed that morning.

That morning the Holy Spirit came to indwell the apostles and disciples of Jesus: and the Church was born. The Christians were suddenly full of life and power, utterly different from their former fearful selves. The change in them was permanent.

Peter gave the first ever sermon of the Christian Church that morning: proclaiming Jesus was the Messiah. His boldness in the face of possible death was in marked contrast to the man who had denied Jesus 50 days before. And 3,000 people responded, were converted, and were baptised. How's that for fast church growth!

Of course Pentecost was not the first time the Holy Spirit had acted in this world. All through the Old Testament there are accounts of how God's Spirit guided people and strengthened them. But now, because of Christ's death and resurrection, he could INDWELL them. From now on, every Christian could have the confidence that Jesus was with them constantly, through the indwelling of the Holy Spirit.

Don't regret the past; create the future.

St ALBAN

St Alban, whose special day is 22nd June, was the first English martyr, the first English person to be killed for the Christian faith.

He lived in Verulanium which was an important Roman settlement in Hertfordshire. At the time the Romans were persecuting followers of Jesus and Alban was brave enough to shelter a travelling Christian priest. Exchanging clothes with the priest so that he could escape, Alban was arrested.

When asked to prove his loyalty to Rome and the Emperor by making offerings to the Roman gods, Alban



declared his faith in 'the true and living God who created all things'. He was condemned to death and had his head cut off.

All this happened a long time ago but St Alban is remembered today in the name of the place where he lived and died: Verulanium was renamed the city of St Albans.
