And God's grace was so powerfully at work in them all' - Acts 4:33

This time last year I had the great privilege of going to Portugal and being on a Holy Week mission with Bishop Sifredo and meeting our Methodist sisters and brothers in that beautiful country. We did many exciting outreach initiatives. On Easter Day I was at Aveiro

Methodist Church, a thrilling place to be. We passed by a large Roman Catholic procession, children in white and the bright sun gleaming on the banners.

Methodists are small comparison, but each church member was invited to bring a person to Easter breakfast and the hall was full when I arrived and shared in a very hearty breakfast. The worship band and singers enabled us to worship in the glory of the risen Christ and I preached on Mary's encounter with the risen Lord - challenging the congregation to meet with him too. The silver chalices and beautiful loaf were uncovered on the table.

I had an interpreter and so my words could have been misunderstood, but I held half the bead and said: "If you want a living relationship with the risen Christ take and eat". At which point a blonde young woman got up in her pew walked down the aisle and dug into the bread weeping. She pushed the bread down her throat.

It's the strongest reaction I've ever known to someone wanting to encounter the triumphant Jesus. A Methodist President and brilliant speaker of years past, the Revd Dr William Sangster, was found by his wife one Easter morning weeping. He had muscular atrophy and could not speak. She said: "Why are you crying Will?" He wrote on a piece of paper: 'It is Easter Day and I cannot say: "Hallelujah".

This Easter, with joy and love, may we all cry Hallelujah and encounter the risen Lord.

A message for Easter from the Chairs of the London District

As a team of Chairs we are delighted and privileged to be granted with the opportunity to visit circuits around the district.

Throughout our travels within the Circuits we witness many of our congregations encouraging their communities to encounter the risen Christ in so many different ways; this can be seen through worship, youth works, bright hours, fellowship groups, uniformed organisations, refugee projects, lunch clubs and the list goes on.

A majority of these marvellous activities happen week by week as part of ministry and mission in the local church, and are seen as the life giving things we do in our local churches and communities, it is through activities like that so many people encounter the risen Christ.

Encounters with the risen Christ turn lives around. This transformation not only occurred in the first century as we read throughout the gospels

The cowardly, quarrelling disciples, so often uncomprehending, so often weak, become, through the resurrection, brave and united. The resurrection happens not only to Jesus, but, in a way, to his disciples as well

They are lifted from the narrow tomb of their former existence and thrust into the sunlight of a spacious life. This resurrection process has never stopped happening since that first Easter Day. People and places continue to be transformed, just as after Easter last year we saw evidence of this all around our district.

We comprehend that where they were once wounded have become sources of strength, for grace has done its healing work. It reminds us that this, resurrected Jesus refuses to remain only a victim. Still marked by the wounds of the cross, the risen Lord appears in the midst of his disciples, offering the world forgiveness. He fills his disciples.

with forgiveness first, and commands them to pass on this gift to others.

The resurrection of Christ is no isolated event. The resurrection of Christ declares that our separation from God, our separation from each other, is all in the resurrection. Contact with, the risen Christ, brings transformation: we start to become what in our best moments we can be.

Easter is not one morning only, or even the church season that extends for 50 days. Easter is a way of life. The Risen One waits for us in scripture and sacrament, in prayer and music, in community and service. The Risen One waits for us in the faces of those who love us, and in the faces of those who need our love. The Risen One waits for us in every corner. His resurrection is not an idle tale. It is not even just barefaced fact. His resurrection is something more: it is a vibrant reality, a force for the future.

Without the Easter story Jesus would have been little more than a flare in the night. Darkness would have still had the last word. We all go through death and resurrection experiences in our life, this may be the physical death of a loved one or when something goes wrong in our life, and we see the light and the dark cloud of pain or gloom is removed can be classed as resurrection moments.

We continue to remember we are a Good Friday People as well as an Easter People!

In support of Brussels

It is with shock and deep sadness that we have again witnessed the murder of people going about their everyday lives. Londoners will watch the news of the explosions in Brussels and will remember the attacks on public transport in July 2005.

The images and memories are vivid and remind us again of the vulnerability of life and the willingness of a handful of people to assert their own agenda through acts of terror and violence.

In the past few days lives have also been lost in Afghanistan, Pakistan and in many other places, often with little coverage on western media. Each life lost in an airport, market place, metro station or school is a cost too great. In the great complexity of the political realities that surround us it is tempting to lose sight of those individual lives and to feel helpless. Yet in all of the acts of cruelty that we witness, we see people putting their own lives at risk to help the injured and the vulnerable, we see people of different faiths standing in solidarity with each other, we see courage that we only hope we might demonstrate in the same circumstances

As we consider the most unholy of actions in the midst of our Holy Week reflections, I pray that we will notice the acts of human decency and dignity in the midst of the carnage and chaos.

When we consider again the cross of Jesus and his divine humanity, I pray that we will not be blind to the common humanity we share with our neighbours.

Many of our Muslim brothers and sisters receive abuse, verbal and physical, when such events as have happened in Brussels take place and there is a great deal of pressure on the Islamic communities in the our city.

Whilst we may feel helpless in the face of violence and events in Syria, we are able to be peacemakers in our own context. Consider ways in which you and your church can develop friendships with Muslim neighbours in your own community. Pray for their flourishing and the well-being of people of all faiths and none and reflect the sacrificial love of God as revealed in Jesus Christ.

Governments must do more to help Syria's people

The Methodist Church, along with three other major UK Churches, has called on governments to provide substantial new funding to alleviate the suffering of the people of Syria, including refugees in the neighbouring countries of Lebanon, Turkey and Jordan.

The recent call from the Baptist Union of Great Britain, the Church of Scotland, the Methodist Church and the United Reformed Church came on the eve of the international pledging conference for Syria.

The Revd Steve Wild, President of the Methodist Conference, said: "The bombing and shelling of civilian areas by the Syrian Government and other groups has caused immense death and suffering. The disregard for civilian life has been shocking; it is callous and totally unacceptable, even in war."

Launch of first London Christian Book Fair



The first London Christian Book Fair, a show-within-a-show, is to be held as part of the forthcoming Christian Resources Exhibition International*. As last year's visitors to CRE spent about £40,000 on books and music, the Christian Book Fair will be building on a firm foundation.

The Book Fair will include seminars and book signings with authors published by SPCK, Lion Hudson, CWR, Cambridge University Press and William Collins.

For the first time, CRE International will also host a Youth Zone with youth organisations represented together in one area. Eco Street will help churches look at theological issues surrounding ecology and offer practical ways to respond.

More than 300 exhibitors are expected to take part at CRE.

FROM THE CHURCH COUNCIL

The most recent meeting of the Church Council was on 3rd March and was attended by 11 members of the Council (out a total of 24) plus 2 representatives from the King's Hall Class Meeting.

Recent meetings have begun with a discussion of some aspect of church life before continuing on to matters of church business – finance, property and so on. This meeting began with a discussion on 'congregation development'.

Congregational Development

Starting the discussion, Rev Rachel Bending suggested that we should see the vision process as part of normal church life – you will recall that we have had two 'awaydays' and some after-service lunches to think about where we are going as a church.

Council decided that we should hold another 'awayday' in the Autumn with a provisional date of 19th October so that we can spend time together away from the church. This time members of the King's Hall Class Meeting will be invited to join us – the Class Meeting is formally part of Kingsdown. Rachel suggested a venue closer to home,

possibly the Kairos Centre in Roehampton.

The meeting was positive towards the idea, but it was noted that some of us in the church have mixed feelings towards the idea of 'awaydays' and feel that the money could be better spent. However, the funding for the 'awaydays' came from the 'Talents' grant from the Circuit and was intended to be used for some form of mission development.

Given where Kingsdown was at the end of the long and arduous redevelopment compounded by changes in our ministers, the initial rationale of taking some 'time out' to consider our future path as a church met the Circuit's criteria for use of the grant. We still have sufficient of the grant left to fund a further 'awayday' but Rachel suggested that if people feel they would like to make a donation of time or money in return they would be very welcome to do so.

Volunteers are required to organise the 'awayday' – speak to Rachel! Worship being a major part of church life, there will be a Worship Consultation on 15th May after the morning service. This will give us a chance to review the impact of using 'We Make the Road by Walking' for themed worship. In addition we will asked to consider whether we should continue with themed worship from this coming September or whether worship should be based on the lectionary.

A further aim of the meeting will be to get over the message that we are all part of the process of deciding how our worship should be conducted. In this context, Rachel commented that other Circuit ministers who had preached at Kingsdown had noticed a greater spiritual 'feel' to the services they had conducted at our church.

Turning to matters of business....

Finance

Derek Matthews presented the accounts for the year to 31st August 2015 and these were duly approved. He also indicated that the provisional results for the first 6 months of this financial year showed a modest surplus. One unexpected cost which we will face from April onwards is for waste collection. Until now waste from churches has been treated as household waste and has been collected free of charge.

From 1st April, however Ealing Council will be raising charges on

churches and other non-profit organisations. As we are legally obliged to have our waste collected we have no option but to arrange a contract for its collection. The Council decided to remain with Ealing Council at a cost of about £910 pa.

Safeguarding

Sybil Corbin reported that there would be changes to safeguarding procedures following from the recent Past Cases Review. In particular, the safeguarding training module is being updated and as a result, current training needs are on hold pending the new material. In addition, our DBS checks are in the process of being renewed and brought fully up to date.

Pastoral Visitors would now be subject to checks if they visit vulnerable adults in the name of the church. Rachel noted that only those people playing certain specific roles in the church would be subject to DBS checks, but where checks are required they are obligatory.

Property

Janet Smith reported that certain parts of the church frontage needed attention. In particular work is required on the apex of the frontage as well as on the fascia boards on the frontage and above the main entrance. The external cross had been examined and found to have been inadequately sealed before installation and would require more work than previously. The total cost would be of the order of £3,000 based on three quotes obtained. Council agreed that this work should go ahead.

Charity of the Year

The World Service and Mission Committee proposed that Hope for Southall Street Homeless be the Charity of the Year for 2016-17. Council endorsed the proposal.

King's Hall

Rachel Bending told the meeting that the King's Hall building had been re-marketed. There had been nine bids, four of which would be interviewed. Negotiations would proceed with the preferred bidder.

In addition there were two late proposals. The first was from Wesley Hotels (formerly the Methodist International Centre) to develop a hotel with facilities, and the second for a development with a housing trust of affordable housing alongside church space. In both these cases the property would remain with the Methodist Church. Rachel commented that it was likely to be a minimum of three years before completion of the development.

In order to make continued Methodist mission in Southall more public, Rachel will be requesting a grant of £100 to purchase a small gazebo, table and chairs that can be put up at the front of King's Hall on Thursday lunchtimes. This would allow contact and discussion with passers-by.

Currently, the King's Hall Class Meeting has no voting representative on Circuit Meeting – at the moment, George Lafford and Bill Carty attend as non-voting observers.

Rachel suggested that one of them could replace one of Kingsdown's current representatives. The meeting agreed that George Lafford replace one of Kingsdown's existing representatives.

Other things

An approach had been received from Heinz Chapel Choir of Pittsburgh University offering us a free concert on 6th May 2017. The meeting agreed to accept the offer. Noted that volunteers would be needed to organise publicity, refreshments etc.

Deacon Lemia Nkwelah, who joined the Circuit last September

will be ordained on Conference Sunday (3rd July) at Central Hall Westminster

ETHIOPIA

Erratic Rain and El Nino

"The combination of erratic rains and El Niño have resulted in millions being put at risk of starvation in Ethiopia", said Erica Bertolotto, All We Can Partnership Manager for Ethiopia. "Our local partners have reported increased pressure on the already vulnerable communities they work with, in many regions crops have completely failed. The majority of Ethiopians rely on agriculture to make a living, but much of the already limited farming land is suffering and people are struggling to eke out enough to live on. The situation is very serious."

All We Can has been supporting its local Ethiopian partner, Sustainable Natural Resources Management Association (SUNARMA), since 2004. SUNARMA work to improve soil and water conservation and vegetable and livestock production in central Ethiopia. One of the areas they work in, Ankober Woreda, has been identified by the Ethiopian government as one of the regions most seriously affected by the drought. All We Can has provided £22,000 to SUNARMA to help provide nearly 3000 people with emergency food supplies such as wheat and oil.

SUNARMA will be working with other agencies and the local government to ensure that those most vulnerable to the impact of the drought in Ankaber Woreda will be reached first

Ethiopia is not the same country as it was 30 years ago, when conflict and political factors exacerbated the famine. There has been significant progress and development since the 1980s. At a local level, All We Can has seen amazing changes through investment in sustainable agriculture solutions, and its partners have helped thousands of families improve their incomes and quality of life in recent years. The Ethiopian government has been able to set aside nearly £130m to deal with this current crisis, but it is not enough. The combination of the lack of rain and the El Niño climate phenomenon has taken its toll, and a global response is now required. As Erica Bertolotto explains, "One of the mistakes of 1984 was a failure to deal with the famine until it became a major humanitarian disaster. All We Can's partners and the Ethiopian government are calling on the international community to ensure that the mistakes of the past are not repeated, to prevent this crisis from becoming a catastrophe."



EalingLive at Home

Supporting independence for older people







"We have lovely staff who make our afternoon as pleasant as possible and give help when needed. It is very important to have a local Live at Home scheme, giving elderly people the opportunity to make friends and avoid loneliness."

The MHA is a charity that provides services for older people throughout the UK. The MHA has established 'Live at Home' community services that have been operational since 1988 and are now in over 70 locations across the UK. These 'Live at Home' schemes offer a range of services and support to older people living in their own homes. The aim is to promote independent, active and fulfilled lives. However, the schemes do not provide personal care.

Supported by the MHA, our Methodist Church Ealing Trinity Circuit has started a 'Live at Home' Scheme in the Ealing Borough and our offices are at the Greenford Methodist Church. This scheme is called the MHA-Ealing Live at Home Scheme.

In our efforts we are working with the Ealing Council, Stay Active 4 Life and of course the MHA to provide strength and balance classes. We have run exercise 23 classes across the Ealing Borough in this partnership so far.

We have started a Coffee morning at Greenford Methodist Church. The Strength and balance class at our Northolt Methodist Church enjoy a light lunch, after exercises, for a small extra fee. A Grow and Eat club is set to start soon and will be growing plants of vegetables and flowers by the start of summer.

The scheme is indeed a product of the Methodist Homes and the Ealing Trinity Circuit Methodist Church of the Ealing Borough. However, we open doors to all faiths and none of this diverse community of Ealing. All are welcome!




'Visions of the Sacred' will run from 9th April until 22nd May.


On 9th April the exhibition will be open from 12.00 – 6.00 pm and there will be a special opening reception at 6.00 pm attended by the Mayor of Ealing.

For more than 75 years, the Heinz Chapel Choir has presented a cappella music from a variety of time periods and cultural traditions and in a wealth of languages. The Choir's home for the majority of its Pittsburgh performances is the Heinz Memorial Chapel on the University of Pittsburgh campus. The ensemble can be heard in the early fall Choral Showcase (with the Pitt Men's Glee Club and Women's Choral Ensemble), in their highly regarded holiday concert series (broadcast for the past 15 years on WQED-FM), in their spring concert, and at special University functions. The Heinz Chapel Choir is currently under the direction of its tenth conductor, Dr. Susan Rice.

An auditioned ensemble, the Choir is composed of students pursuing many and diverse areas of study in major, minor and certificate concentration. The talented members devote four hours per week for rehearsals, attend Choir Camp each semester, and receive one college credit for their participation.

The Queen is 'very grateful' for the nation's prayers

In a strong statement of faith, the Queen has said that she is 'very grateful' to the nation for its prayers for her and that she has felt God's 'faithfulness' during 64 years on the throne.

The comments – rare insights into the Queen's personal thoughts and Christian faith – came in the forward to a new book, The Servant Queen and the King She Serves, published by Bible Society, HOPE and LICC.

Her Majesty said, 'I have been – and remain – very grateful to you for your prayers and to God for His steadfast love. I have indeed seen His faithfulness.'

The book was published to mark the Queen's 90th birthday. In her comments, the Queen referred to the changes she has seen in her life, which has made her the longest-reigning monarch in British history.

'The extent and pace of change has been truly remarkable,' she said. 'We have witnessed triumphs and tragedies.' And she alluded to the current problems in the Middle East saying that the world is now experiencing 'terrible suffering on an unprecedented scale'.

The Queen's Christian faith is well-known. In recent years, Her Majesty has referred to her beliefs in public statements, including Christmas broadcasts.

The Servant Queen and the King She Serves highlights the Queen's faith and how it has shaped her personal life and service to the nation. A 12-page schools version has been published by Scripture Union.

23 April - St George - our patron saint (who isn't English) by David Winter

It's perhaps typical of the English that they should have a patron saint who isn't English, about whom next to nothing is known for sure, and who may not have existed at all. That didn't stop him being patriotically invoked in many battles, notably at Agincourt and in the Crusades, and of course it is his cross that adorns the flags of English football fans to this day.

It's most likely that he was a soldier, a Christian who was martyred for his faith somewhere in Palestine, possibly at Lydda, in the early fourth century. At some point in the early centuries of the Church he became associated with wider military concerns, being regarded as the patron saint of the Byzantine armies. There is no doubt that he was held as an example of the 'godly soldier', one who served Christ as bravely and truly as he served his king and country.

The story of George and the dragon is of much later date and no one seems to know where it comes from. By the middle ages, when George was being honoured in stained glass, the dragon had become an invaluable and invariable visual element, so that for most people the two are inseparable. Pub signs have a lot to answer for here: 'The George and Dragon'.

However, it's probably more profitable to concentrate on his role as a man who witnessed to his faith in the difficult setting of military service, and in the end was martyred for his faithfulness to Christ.

The idea of the 'Christian soldier' was, of course, much loved by the Victorian hymn-writers - 'Onward, Christian soldiers!' The soldier needs discipline. The heart of his commitment is to obedience. The battle cannot be avoided nor the enemy appeased. He marches and fights alongside others, and he is loyal to his comrades. In the end, if the battle is won, he receives the garlands of victory, the final reward of those who overcome evil.

St George's Day presents a challenge and an opportunity. The challenge is to distance the message of his life from the militarism and triumphalism that can easily attach itself to anything connected to soldiers and fighting. The opportunity is to celebrate the ideal of the 'Christian soldier' - one who submits to discipline, sets out to obey God truly, does not avoid the inevitable battle with all that is unjust, wrong and hateful in our world, and marches alongside others fighting the same noble cause. Discipline, obedience, courage, fellowship and loyalty - they're not the most popular virtues today, but that doesn't mean that they don't deserve our gratitude and admiration.
