

I begin by saying thank you for your warm welcome to Ealing it feels very familiar already. Here as summer has come to an end and the new school year and autumn is upon us and I guess for many the pace of life will speed up, that is if it ever slowed down!

Listening to the news with its catalogue of challenges facing humanity it is all too easy to immerse oneself in more activity. Across the world, and here in this country, there are many challenges to face and so many ways to address them. The question is what to do? What should our priority be when everything seems so important?

As these storms rage around us we are so easily blown this way and that in earnest efforts to assist and encourage. However, when the storm briefly dies down we find we have moved very little and are just more tired than before.

A recent article on the radio attracted my attention - although I cannot tell you exactly what it was about, I was too busy rushing around - the thing that has held in my mind is that one of the contributors was the author of a book entitled "In Praise of Slow".

The author talked about the way children in particular are over stimulated and never allowed to get "bored" and he was suggesting that there was a need to learn to value stillness, even if it led to the initial cry of 'boredom'.

In the 19th century and early 20th churches provided Sunday schools to help teach language and other skills to children who otherwise would not get such an opportunity. This is no longer the case thankfully, however there appears to be a new need around in the 21st century not only for children but all of us.

The poet William Henry Davies wrote:

What is this life if, full of care,
We have no time to stand and stare.
No time to stand beneath the boughs
And stare as long as sheep or cows.
No time to see, when woods we pass,
Where squirrels hide their nuts in grass.
No time to see, in broad daylight,
Streams full of stars, like skies at night.
No time to turn at Beauty's glance,
And watch her feet, how they can dance.
No time to wait till her mouth can
Enrich that smile her eyes began.
A poor life this if, full of care,
We have no time to stand and stare.

I believe this is the challenge facing society to learn to stand and stare, to be still?

So before we rush madly into the autumn round of events and business maybe this is the time for us to explore the art of stillness and reflection within our own or by taking time to come together in worship as a community - to be rather than to do.

They are trying to raise funds for a scanner/printer, so we are asked to use the envelopes which will appear in the pews from 7 October to donate a monetary gift. After the morning service, there will be a Kingsdown Family lunch in the hall which will be an opportunity for us all to meet and talk to Peter, Suva and Rebecca Catford. During our meal we shall share a large celebration cake, and portions of that cake will also be sent to the very small number of elderly and housebound members to whom it is customary to take a gift at harvest time. Please add your name to the list in the foyer if you intend to be present for the lunch, to assist the caterers.

Many people also like to bring flowers, fruit and vegetables to decorate the church for Harvest. Usually we are overwhelmed by the generosity of our members and, while the display always looks lovely and reminds us of the abundance of good things we receive from God, we often have difficulty knowing how to distribute the gifts of fresh produce appropriately.

So this year we would ask you to think carefully about what would be most suitable and if you wish to give such a gift, perhaps to choose tinned or packet goods in preference to fresh food. Then any surplus can be donated to the homelessness project based at St John's church, which we support in co-operation with other churches in West Ealing. Their soup kitchen opens only at weekends, so gifts to them must be non-perishable.

Contributions for the decorations should be brought to the church on Saturday 13 October by 10 o'clock. Offers of help with the display hat morning should be made as soon as possible to Pam. Thank you.

Age discrimination ban to come into force on 1 October 2012

Unjustified age discrimination is already prohibited in the workplace, and the Government have abolished the default retirement age.

On 5 September 2012 the House of Commons approved the Order containing exceptions from the ban on age discrimination in the provision of services, which had been debated the day before in Committee.

The House of Lords had already approved the Exceptions Order last July, so the way is now clear for the ban to come into force on 1 October.

The ban will affect public and private organisations and means that treating people differently because of their age when providing goods, facilities or services will be unlawful unless it is covered by an exception or can be justified.

1. In the September Messenger, page 11, para. 2, you will read House-to-house collecting £144.92. This should read £1,442.92* - "and this was achieved with just 17 collectors" (quite a difference). I should like to say a very sincere thank you to the 16 collectors (I'm the other) who go out House-to-house collecting during Christian Aid Week. I know it isn't easy the first few calls can be difficult. But then we remember why we are asking for donations, and realise how worthwhile it is. I have said, on numerous occasions, that this is the only time we go out to local people, from Kingsdown, using the word - CHRISTIAN - a Challenge?

The total of £3,666.54 is correct. Hopefully, as a result of the Richmond Park sponsored Walk, we shall again exceed £4,000.00.

(*What Ruby has been kind enough <u>not</u> to point out is that the incorrect House-to-house total was entirely due to your co-editor's failure to read what she had written correctly! - Sorry Ruby!)

2. CHRISTIAN AID WEEK - 2012

I have just been informed by Rubita, at Christian Aid, that the total so far for CA Week 2012 is £10.6m. The final total will not be known for some time but at this stage is an advance on last year.

3. **The Annual Supporters' Evening** will be held at Christian Aid HQ, Inter-Church House, near Waterloo Station, on **Thursday, 31 January**; two sessions again in 2013 - 2-4.30 pm or 6-8.30 pm. I'm sure we shall attend the afternoon session as last year. This is a great opportunity to find out 2013's CA Week materials, to meet other volunteers from London and the South East, and to hear about a very important year for campaigning. Everyone is welcome to attend, please let me know nearer the time - <u>BUT PLEASE BOOK THE DATE - NOW</u>.

4. TELL - PRAY - GIVE - WALK

As a church, we do not contribute to the CA Harvest Appeal as this is the time for Charity of the Year.

This year Christian Aid will focus on the landless people of India. CA Partner Ekta Parished believes that permanent access to land is vital and could lift as

much as 40 per cent of India's population - 400 million people - out of poverty.

On 2 October 2011, representatives of CA's partner Ekta Parished began a 13 month-long journey across India, joining the voices of communities across the country in their urgent call for land reform. The climax in October will see 100,000 landless people, many barefoot, march for a month from Gwalion to Delhi, in one of the biggest non-violent campaignsthe world has ever witnessed. Jumma and Kamala Anivasi plan to march again in October insolidarity with others, like Khima Ram, whose struggle for land rights continues.

Latin America




MRDF has a small programme in Latin America. This continent has seen much development in recent years, but the rich-poor divide continues to widen, with indigenous communities often unable to start the journey out of poverty. This situation is compounded by a changing climate that affects their primary source of income: their land.

Planting for the future in El Salvador



Deforestation and erratic weather conditions have severely damaged the livelihoods of El Salvador's small-scale farmers. MRDF's partner organisation is working with communities displaced by the civil war helping to introduce sustainable agriculture techniques. These replace the modern methods that require a lot of chemicals and give little thought to conservation. Farmers now have security for the present, reaping healthy harvests, and are protecting their soil for the future.

Farming at school in Guatemala



For Mayan communities in Guatemala, scarcity of land means that people are turning to cultivating steeply sloping land to try and escape poverty. Modern intensive farming methods, such as the planting of monocultures, are unsuitable for these areas. MRDF's partner is promoting a holistic approach that includes increasing crop diversity. School pupils in the Suchitoto area have been provided with a range of different vegetables and medicinal plants, and are learning to grow and care for them. In the past, formal education didn't provide such practical skills, but now these children will be better equipped for a productive farming future.



Demba and Tonko



In the village of Tama, (pronounced: Ta-ma) the 2010 drought also caused farmers to struggle. Demba (on the right) explains: 'What we planted at first was okay but what we planted second was rotten. A second failed harvest meant I did not get the money I was expecting. This creates many problems. If the harvest is not complete you will face a lack of food.'

MRDF's partner AMAPEF listened to the problems that the farmers were experiencing. It responded by setting up a demonstration plot testing new agricultural techniques, so farmers could see for themselves whether the new practices would work or not. Demba's friend Tonko says: 'At the end of the demonstration time we saw that the demonstration field had produced many more crops than the field where we used our old techniques! It was a wonderful thing for us to see! 'Simple techniques such as spacing crops correctly, and using walls to help prevent soil being washed away in the rainy season, are making a big difference.

Tonko has also learnt the benefit of using manure on his field. He says: 'The change is actually an easy one –simply using natural manure on the field has made a big increase in our crops. Where we had one full bag of maize that would now be two or even three full bags. The techniques have made a difference, so how can we ignore that?'

The farmers who received training from AMAPEF have been encouraged to pass on their knowledge to others in their village. Tonko adds: 'Those who did not take part in the training... they missed out! I took them to my field to show them what I was doing and the change it had made and then I instructed them on how they could change what they were doing too. This was such good advice you have to pass it on.'

'In sweet music is such art': Hours in the valley of tears

One of the most popular modern hymns is 'Make me a channel of your peace.' It is based on a prayer attributed to one of the most popular saints, Francis. The Little Man of Assisi has inspired the faith and lives of many through his simplicity and love of creation. But the picture of St Francis talking to the birds and charming animals is only part of his story. His conversion to the Gospel message inspired him to renounce all possessions and to embrace poverty.

That example encouraged others to follow at a time where there was a deep concern about the wealth and authority of the church in Western Europe. Small groups of committed Christians came together to live out the precepts of Jesus' teaching, which they felt the institutional church had neglected. At first they were viewed with suspicion and were thought to be heretics – the hippies, the dropouts of the 13th century. And St Francis and his brothers were among them.

This aspect of St Francis inspired Zeffirelli's film of 1972, 'Brother Sun, Sister Moon.' It was released when flower power and communes were in the air. Zeffirelli's film is shot through with scenes of fields and hills and sunsets. We see Francis and Clare walking through the corn in the noonday sun, seemingly without a care in the world. But there is more to the film than just these images.

Yes, St Francis was like a dropout in medieval Italy. Yet there was a rigour and a faith at the heart of his love of the infant Jesus and his passion for the cross of Christ. They arose out of a profound realisation that God had earthed himself in this world and revealed himself in Jesus, who like St Francis, talked of the birds in the air and the lilies of the field as he praised God's providential care for creation

The film is one of contrasts to convey this message: warring knights and peace loving monks, sumptuous churches and simple chapels, a wealthy and powerful ecclesiastical élite and the humble ordinariness of peasant life. They are captured in the music of Donovan, who provided the score for the film: martial processions and elaborate liturgical music contrast with the round of singing in San Damiano and the title song, 'Brother Sun, Sister Moon.'

The high point of the film comes when St Francis and his brothers have an audience with Pope Innocent III. It is a moving encounter of the bejewelled pope and the simply attired monk. As Innocent III kisses the saint's feet, he says, 'We are encrusted with riches and power: you in your poverty put us to

shame.' The Gloria of the liturgy gives way to the title track; the sumptuous cathedral with bishops and cardinals to the saint alone in the hillside.

We celebrate St Francis this month on 4 October. Perhaps we might watch this film on DVD and find that, allowing for its 1970s ethos, we can hear once again in the drama and the music the message of St Francis - Il Poverello of Assisi who calls us like the larks in the air to live in simplicity and humility and so meet God in the ordinary gifts of his creation: the sun and the moon, the birds and the animals, men, women and children, and the wonder of a babe born in a manger.

Happy Birthday, Singing the Faith!

One year ago, Singing the Faith was published: a collection of 840 hymns and songs, that would take an estimated forty hours to sing from beginning to end.

The collection was published by Hymns Ancient and Modern on behalf of the Methodist Church, after seven years of deliberation, theological scrutiny, musical collaboration and editing. To date, nearly 98,000 copies have been sold across all the published editions.



Peter Brophy, who was Editor-in-Chief of Singing the Faith, said: "Having completed the editorial tasks for 'Singing the Faith' it was first of all a delight to handle the published book - all those scraps of paper, urgent emails and even more urgent phone calls now transformed into a hymnbook - a physical testament to the dedicated volunteers who worked for a Biblical seven years to bring it to fruition.

The Singing the Faith Plus website offers a wide range of free resources to help people get the most out of the collection, with lectionary suggestions and creative ideas for using hymns, for singing or in other ways. The site is also fast becoming a popular platform for new hymns and an encouragement to emerging writers.

"This beautifully presented hymn book is transforming worship through the sheer diversity of the hymns and songs contained within its pages," said the Revd Dr Mark Wakelin, President of the Methodist Conference. "Singing the Faith is the one hymn and song book you have to have."

The Revd Barbara Bircumshaw, Chair of the Music Resources Group which was responsible for producing the collection, said: "I am thrilled by the success of Singing the Faith. It's great that it is being widely used by congregations around the Connexion - more than I ever dreamed possible. And it's very humbling to have played a part in bringing Singing the Faith to birth! I pray that it will be a valuable tool for worship and witness, for glorifying God and sharing the Gospel in the twenty first century."
