

Dear friends

As I write we are in the end stages of an election campaign. Manifestos have been published and party lines drawn. There has been much discussion of who might be willing to join whom to create a coalition. Politicians have spent much time trying to persuade us that a vote for them will make us better off. It seems to me that, more than ever in my memory, commentators are suggesting that they can't work out who to vote for: Piers Morgan this week said he was certain to vote but had no idea where he would put his cross and his allegiance.

In preparation for the election various Christian denominations have published documents looking at the issues. Each has carefully looked at issues that may feature in the election campaign and some which sadly may not and asked us to consider not only our own needs and well being but those of our neighbours locally, nationally and globally. Having thought and prayed it asks us to make sure we vote.

A document published by the Joint Public Issues Team (Methodist, Baptist, URC and Church of Scotland) says:

"Archbishop Desmond Tutu once said: "When people say that the Bible and politics don't mix, I ask them which Bible they are reading."

Our Christian faith is woven through with a concern for justice, peace and the integrity of creation. We seek to answer questions such as how immigrants should be treated, whether a nation should go to war and how we are stewards of the environment. These are issues for living our discipleship today as they were when the Bible was written.

Now is the time for the Churches and wider civil society to do what they can to join the debate, to help communities understand the issues and to contribute in a positive way to the democratic process.

Of course, the Bible doesn't tell Christians which party to vote for. Christians can be united in a common faith but have different ideas about how politics can best serve the common good.

The weeks leading up to polling day are a chance for us all to scrutinise ideas and ask questions before making a decision about who we want to lead us for the next five years."

From the Church Council

The last meeting of the Church Council was on 19th March – just before the April edition of the Messenger went to press.

Starting with matters financial, Rob Hutchings presented the half year accounts for the church. These showed a surplus of £7,800 for the 6 months ending on 28th February. This is significantly better than the budget for the period. Income was about £6,400 higher than expected, mainly due to increased lettings income, whilst expenses had been about £1,400 lower than expected. At the end of the connexional year, Rob expected the church to have a surplus of about £10,000.

We should all be aware that Rob Hutchings formally resigned as Treasurer at the end of December, but has been happy to carry on in the role pending the appointment of a successor. Whilst volunteers have come forward for the all the peripheral tasks (Gift Aid Secretary, banking, lettings invoicing etc), no one to date has volunteered for the central role of Treasurer.

Our relationship with the Guides was discussed as they haven't attended Parade Services for some considerable time. It was agreed that an informal meeting should be set up with the Guide leader to

discuss ways in which our relationship with the Guides can be strengthened.

There was positive feedback from AwayDay on 7th March. particularly the opportunity to talk in depth with a small number of other people. Whilst it was felt that it would be good to get to know each other better, it was clear that the time before and after church services does not lend itself to the kind of discussion required. It was suggested that there should be regular lunches to allow people to engage more fully with each other. Monthly was felt to be too frequent, and quarterly more appropriate. The venue could be at the church Room) or possibly (hall/Dome external – a venue in Roehampton was mooted but there were concerns about access by public transport. This idea was to be put to people at the lunch on 19th April when Wendy Beard's report on the AwayDay would also be presented.

As you will all know, Kingsdown participated in the Ealing Churches Winter Night Shelter during November/December last year. The Project Co-ordinator for the scheme, Alison Wood has sent us a letter of thanks particularly as we agreed to operate the Shelter at fairly short notice. Alison also asked if we would be prepared to participate in

the scheme again this year, for four Sunday nights 29th November – 20th December. The meeting agreed in principle to operating the Shelter at Kingsdown again this year, subject to sufficient volunteers being available.

The meeting heard that more help is needed with the regular Book Fairs to set up and put away. However, the meeting also felt that consideration should be given to the future of these fairs given the amount of work involved.

The meeting agreed to a suggestion from Rachel Bending that from September, our services should follow a consistent theme based on 'We Make the Road by Walking' by Brian McClaren. This book is divided into 52 chapters and weekby-week will take us through the whole Bible story. In addition, the meeting decided that the former evening service should be removed from the external church notice board. This time slot is now used for periodic Bible study series organised by the Circuit, which are much appreciated by those who attend them

Our 'World Service' service will be on 24th May. A small group is organising this service which will be focussed on our experiences of church around the world.

David Street told the meeting that the King's Hall Class Meeting is now very fragile with attendance of only 6 – 7 people each week. However, they still hope to be able to return to King's Hall following its redevelopment, although this is at least 18 months away.

Finally, David Street said that the Circuit was now using funds from the sale of Moullin House and the church building at Perivale to support initiatives, groups, and individuals around the Circuit. Major initiatives include the MHA Live at Home Scheme (support for development manager), School Christian Worker Southall as well as support for people's individual training needs. Churches are encouraged to apply for grants from the Circuit to their initiatives. support Circuit's policy on grant funding can be downloaded from the Circuit website to ao www.ealingtrinity.org.uk/formsand-policies.

The next meeting of the Church Council will be on Thursday 25th June at 8.00pm.

May 14: Ascension Day

Surely the most tender, moving 'farewell' in history took place on Ascension Day. Luke records the story with great poignancy: "When Jesus had led them out to the vicinity of Bethany, he lifted up his hands - and blessed them."

As Christmas began the story of Jesus' life on earth, so Ascension Day completes it, with his return to his Father in heaven. Jesus' last act on earth was to bless his disciples. He and they had a bond as close as could be: they had just lived through three tumultuous years of public ministry and miracles – persecution and death – and resurrection! Just as we part from our nearest and dearest by still looking at them with love and memories in our eyes, so exactly did Jesus: "While He was blessing them, He left them and was taken up into heaven." (Luke 24:50-1) He was not forsaking them, but merely going on ahead to a kingdom which would also be theirs one day: "I am ascending to my Father and to your Father, to my God and your God..." (John 20:17)

The disciples were surely the most favoured folk in history. Imagine being one of the last few people on earth to be face to face with Jesus, and have Him look on you with love. No wonder then that Luke goes on: "they worshipped Him - and returned to Jerusalem with great joy. And they stayed continually at the temple, praising God." (Luke 24:52,53)

No wonder they praised God! They knew they would see Jesus again one day! "I am going to prepare a place for you... I will come back and take you to be with me that you also may be where I am." (John 14:2,3) In the meantime, Jesus had work for them to do: to take the Gospel to every nation on earth.

May 24: Day of Pentecost – Whit Sunday

Pentecost took place on the well-established Jewish festival of Firstfruits, which was observed at the beginning of the wheat harvest. It was exactly 50 days after the Passover, the time of Jesus' crucifixion.

A feast day to celebrate the country's wheat harvest does not sound exactly world-changing, but that year, it became one of the most important days in world history. For Pentecost was the day that Jesus sent the Holy Spirit - the day the Church was born.

Jesus had told His apostles that something big was going to happen, and that they were to wait for it in Jerusalem, instead of returning to Galilee. Jesus had plans for his apostles – but He knew they could not do the work themselves – they would need His help.

And so the apostles and disciples waited in Jerusalem, praying together for several days. And then on that fateful morning there was suddenly the sound as of a mighty rushing wind. Tongues of flame flickered on their heads, and they began to praise God in many tongues – to the astonishment of those who heard them. The curse of Babel (Genesis 11: 1-9) was dramatically reversed that morning.

That morning the Holy Spirit came to indwell the apostles and disciples of Jesus: and the Church was born. The Christians were suddenly full of life and power, utterly different from their former fearful selves. The change in them was permanent.

Peter gave the first ever sermon of the Christian Church that morning: proclaiming Jesus was the Messiah. His boldness in the face of possible death was in marked contrast to the man who had denied Jesus 50 days before. And 3,000 people responded, were converted, and were baptised. How's that for fast church growth!

Of course Pentecost was not the first time the Holy Spirit had acted in this world. All through the Old Testament there are accounts of how God's Spirit guided people and strengthened them. But now, because of Christ's death and resurrection, he could INDWELL them. From now on, every Christian could have the confidence that Jesus was with them constantly, through the indwelling of the Holy Spirit.

Still striving for a world without poverty 2015 is the 70th anniversary of the founding of Christian Aid. Born in the ashes of World War Two, it is still responding to needs that are just as vivid today.

The organisation that became Christian Aid was launched in the aftermath of the second world war in the face of huge opposition. Why should we help our former enemies when we were still rationed ourselves?

The brainchild of the British Council of Churches, Christian Reconstruction in Europe was renamed Christian Aid after the 'Christian Aid Week' it created in 1957, to raise funds and awareness.

The churches' initial vision was of a world where every person was respected because they are a human being, a world where women and men, large nations and small, have equal rights; a world where everyone's needs are met; a world where everyone lives in peace and harmony with others as good neighbours; a world without poverty.

As Christian Aid looks back 70 years, we are struck by the fact that the original version still burns brightly and is as relevant today as it was in 1945.

NEPAL Earthquake Appeal

The earthquake, the worst in 81 years, caused devastation in the capital city Kathmandu as well as in isolated mountainous areas of the country including Gorkha district. The epicentre of the earthquake, which measured 7.8 in magnitude, centred around 50 miles east of the second city, Pokhara.

All We Can has been supporting partners working in this region for a number of years and will be responding to the humanitarian crisis through them, drawing on their expertise and knowledge of the land and its people.

The death toll is already in the thousands and is likely to rise. Many more have been injured or displaced and due to the challenging landscape of Nepal it may be some time before the full scale of the disaster is known. There are immediate needs for shelter, food, safe water and sanitation facilities, health services and psycho-social support.

In the immediate aftermath of the earthquake, All We Can made an initial emergency grant of £5000 to its partner Kopila to assist it in providing trauma management and counselling in Kathmandu and the surrounding areas.

We are currently working closely with our partners to assess the situation and identify priority areas for additional support.

Gifts to our emergency appeal will enable us to respond quickly to needs identified over the coming days.

VANUATO Cyclone Pam Update

All We Can is continuing to help people in Vanuatu to recover from the dramatic impact of Cyclone Pam on this small island nation in March.

The people of Vanuatu are used to tropical cyclones, as they are a frequent occurrence in the south-west Pacific, but what occurred on March 13 was something well out of the ordinary for Vanuatu's population of around 267,000 people. Cyclone Pam swept through the nation with winds surpassing 300km per hour. The cyclone devastated businesses, homes and farms, with particular damage being done to the southernmost islands of the country.

All We Can responded immediately to the emergency through our ACT Alliance partners in the region and has so far sent £20,000 to help support the vulnerable in the aftermath of the disaster. Over 3000 people have been internally displaced as a result of Cyclone Pam, many more have suffered extensive damage to their properties and farms and the country as a whole is still working to restore communications and road networks. Our ACT Alliance partners estimate that around 166,000 people living on 22 different islands have been affected in total.

The generous donations given to All We Can's Vanuatu Cyclone Appeal have already been put to use supplying people with much needed shelter, food and clean water. The ACT Alliance response is being coordinated through the Vanuatu Church Partnership Program and over the coming weeks our partners will be working to reinstate water supply systems, secure longer-term shelter for those who lost their homes and to rebuild health and education facilities.



May 31: Trinity Sunday – celebrating our God who is Three Persons

Trying to explain the doctrine of the Trinity has kept many a theologian busy down the centuries. One helpful picture is to imagine the sun shining in the sky. The sun itself – way out there in space – unapproachable in its fiery majesty – is the Father. The light that flows from it, and which illuminates all our lives, is the Son. The heat that flows from it, and which gives us all the energy to move and grow, is the Holy Spirit. You cannot have the sun without its light and its heat. The light and the heat are from the sun, are of the sun, and yet are also distinct in themselves, with their own roles to play.

The Bible makes clear that God is One God, who is disclosed in three persons: Father, Son (Jesus Christ) and Holy Spirit. For example:

Deuteronomy 6:4 'Hear O Israel, The Lord our God, the Lord is one..'

Isaiah 45:22 'Turn to me and be saved... for I am God, and there is no other'

Genesis 1:1-2 'In the beginning God created.... And the Spirit of God was hovering...'

Judges 14:6 etc 'The Spirit of the Lord came upon him in power...'

John 1:1-3 'In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was with God in the beginning. Through him all things were made; without him nothing was made that has been made.'

Luke 24:49 actually manages to squeeze the whole Trinity into one sentence. Jesus tells his disciples: 'I am going to send you what my Father has promised; but stay in the city until you have been clothed with power (the Holy Spirit) from on high.'

In other words, the sun eternally gives off light and heat, and whenever we stand in its brilliant light, we find that the warmth soon follows.

One of the secrets of a long and fruitful life is to forgive everybody everything every night before you go to sleep.

The Way I See It: celebrating the Penny Black

I wrote three letters yesterday. That is such an unusual event that I thought I'd catalogue it. I printed them off my computer, and then looked for an envelope. I couldn't find one. Then I looked for stamps in the drawer where I used to keep them. Again, I could not find them. Undaunted, I put on my coat and walked up to the Post Office, where I queued to buy envelopes and stamps.

Initially, thinking I ought to stock up, I asked for forty first class and forty second class stamps. But when the clerk told me the cost, I revised my order downwards, not wanting to embark on a second mortgage. Then, armed with envelopes (addressed) and stamps I actually posted them, and sometime over the next couple of days my correspondents, who do not have email, will get a letter through their door. Job done!

1st May is the 175th anniversary of the Penny Black, Britain's first official adhesive postage stamp. Ever since then, we have been writing letters, putting them in envelopes, addressing them and sticking a stamp on. In recent years we have been spared the need to lick them, as peel-off stamps have become the fashion. The penny, of course, has multiplied sixty fold, like the biblical wheat, and, oddly, on the whole, letters take longer to arrive now than they did in the days of Queen Victoria.

What we are seeing now looks like the slow death of letter writing, which old'uns like me are supposed deeply to regret. To be fair, I do regret not receiving personal letters (I could do without all the others, mostly appeals, advertisements or official notifications). But I can't expect to get them if I don't send them, and almost all my personal 'correspondence' is via email. Sadly, I don't think people will one day be reading the collected emails of David Winter, or even of distinguished artists, poets or bishops. Letters will go the way of diaries and fountain pens.

Perhaps it's just as well that the invention of the internet is so recent. I can't imagine that St Paul's Email to the Ephesians would have stood the test of time.
