devastating After second earthquake in Nepal, All We Can's local partners (ERDCN and Koplia) have been playing a vital role in helping people to begin to recover. The generosity of AWC's supporters enabled these experienced grass roots organisations to respond quickly and provide relief to some most badly affected the communities. Over £220,000 has been given to the Nepal Earthquake Appeal to date.

A story from the 'Roof of the World' - Sapana Shrestha, aged 26, lives in Chyangli, a village in the Gorkha District. She recalls, "I was sitting in home doing housework and my children were playing around me. Suddenly the land was moving rapidly, I didn't know what was happening. The children were frightened. I stood under the door and I became very nervous. I did not think I would be safe from the earthquake. After a long time the earthquake stopped a little bit and then I ran to a public place with my two little sons.

The walls of my home started to fall down. While we were sitting in the open public place my home totally collapsed. I was very shocked; I

couldn't bring out any equipment from my home. Only on the second day did we start to search for food, clothes, mobile phones and other materials from our collapsed home.

When ERDCN provided a tent and mats we were very happy, as now we can save our family, food, clothes and other materials. We thank ERDCN for visiting our home and community, listening to our painful experiences, and providing some relief materials along with counselling, sympathy and motivation."

Psychological impact - As well as distributing food and emergency shelter materials, AWC is supporting its partner Kopila Nepal to use its expertise to help people deal with the emotional impact of the earthquake through providing trauma counselling.

Kopila Nepal's Director, Bina Silwal, explains the need for this work: "It was a severe time after the earthquake. Everybody was scared, people were crying, people were not eating, people were not doing anything. It was like they had lost consciousness. As a counsellor, someone trained in psychology, I

could see that there would be post-traumatic stress. In response, AWC is supporting Kopila to deliver programme to improve psychosocial well-being in children through school based interventions, funding the creation of materials that can inform people of the psychological support available and will be employing and training counsellors to reach people who have lost loved ones, homes or both. There is an increasing recognition of the need for psychosocial responses after large disasters. Most experts agree best placed to deal with these responses are local organisations that not only have the correct training, but understand local cultural practices and ways of dealing with grief. Kopila Nepal are ideally placed as an organisation with both professional expertise. but also a deep knowledge of the local people and customs.

The road to recovery - AWC is its experienced working with partners to identify the best ways to support recovery and rebuilding. There have already uncharacteristic rains in Nepal in the last month with thunderstorms bringing heavy downpours. When the monsoon season arrives this month it will make access to many places extremely difficult, as dirt roads deteriorate and helicopters are unable to fly. One tarpaulin will no longer be enough to provide

larger families with decent shelter, so even though thousands have already been distributed, more will be needed. Rains may also cause landslides where hillsides have been weakened. It is likely that for people living in inaccessible villages, camps will be set up in village centres so that they can be fed and provided with other services more easily. There are still thousands of people in Nepal living in temporary shelters, and with some villages every house losina earthquake, the need to focus on rebuilding is clear.

Maurice Adams, Chief Executive of AWC, commented: "Out of the turmoil of these earthquakes have emerged of courage, stories generosity and compassion, both in Nepal and here in Britain. The response from AWC supporters has been humbling and enabled our partners to respond rapidly to meet many immediate needs. There is no quick fix for a situation like the one faced by communities affected by the earthquakes, but AWC will be walking alongside our partners every step of the way as they begin the slow road to recovery. On behalf of those partners, and the vulnerable individuals they are supporting, I want to express heartfelt thanks for every donation far to aiven our Earthquake Appeal. It really has made a difference."

Award for

Promoting the Rights of Child Domestic Labourers

Angel Benedicto, a former child domestic labourer from Tanzania, receives her award from HM the Queen for the work she has done in promoting the rights of Child Domestic Labourers, making the world become aware of it and setting up systems of support for them and, of course, prevention.

Last year MWIB's Two Year campaign for the prevention of Child domestic labour, culminated with Helen Veitch and MWIB representatives presenting Vince Cable, with hundreds of signed rubber gloves and urging the



Government to take steps to support the prevention of these children's plight.

Children Unite's main project is raising awareness of this problem which affects children through out the world and particularly Africa.

During my Presidency of Network - MWIB, my chosen charities for fundraising of over £4,600 was for Children Unite and the Adavu Project, based in Birmingham for trafficked women (as reported in past Issues of the Messenger).

MWiB raise funds and draw awareness to a number of projects, such as Dhallit Women in India and Child Domestic. Consequently, when the Project was running, MWiB worked with Children Unite. The poster on p19 of last month's Issue of Messenger, illustrates the project, with both Network and MWiB Logo's.

Children Unite have been working with Angel for the cause of Child Domestic Labour and have supported her visit to the UK.

When the children's Consortium planned the Marathon, last Sunday, Different Organisation, allied to that organisation, was given the opportunity to raise Funds. Angel had planned to be at the start of the race as we set off, but was unable to get there. The money raised by others including myself will go to Angel's project in Tanzania. Angel, and other young adults, from the Commonwealth, were honoured by the queen and given awards for the exemplary work they are engaged in.



Children Unite: Marathon Walk- 21st June- Blossom Jackson

Yes! I was able to complete the Marathon Walk, planned by the Consortium of Street Children, on behalf of Children Unite - an Organisation founded by Helen Veitch and Jonathan Blagrough who between them, have over 40 years' experience in the children's rights and child labour field.

Children Unite- works in partnership with organisations to protect child domestic workers from exploitation and abuse and promote

their rights worldwide

Helen has over 20 years of working in the children's rights field, focusing on the sexual exploitation of children and participatory work with children. She began her career in children's rights working with a community of street children in Indonesia in 1994, then spent eight years

working with children's rights advocacy group ECPAT UK (End Child Prostitution, Pornography and Trafficking).

The walk

The registration Fee was £20, and Additional Travel costs to and from Windsor, on the day.

Our final instructions included that the walk would be 12 Kilometres instead of 10K. So, when Jonathan, with whom I was walking, {along with Helen, their 13 year old daughter Mia, and two Aunts, who had thought they were older than me initially!) checked his pedometer at 9K we hadn't reached Bourne End; we all found out, that the distance was most probably double! And so it was 1/2 Marathon, on checking the distance on our return, after a couple of detours, because we were only given maps and there was inadequate signage!

The scenery was picturesque; the Thames undulating and tranquil, the breeze gentle, the weather just right, the light lunch good; and it was good to hear each other's life-journey stories, as we meandered our way along the dirt tracks..

However, by the time our medals (which had 10K on the disc) were given to us, we were exhausted and had to cope with rebellious muscles which played an orchestra, that was most unwelcome to us, not having had training for the increase in distance!

Nevertheless, I have no regrets and now the pain and stiffness have gone am glad of the good the walk will have done for my health too!

A 'Thank You' letter came from the organisers yesterday, apologising for the distance and stating failure of an application that gave the wrong distance! So I am sure that their planning will be better next time as they have asked for comments, with a view to bettering their performance, next time!

In Children Unite, taking on the project for the Fight for the rights of child domestic labourers and Prevention, their raison d'etre states-

"This is a great opportunity to challenge ourselves and be inspired by children who hope for a better future. A street child in Tanzania offered this piece of advice: 'I would tell all the children not to give up even if life is hard. One day things will change and everything will be alright'"

Massacre in Charleston - A point of view

I cannot believe that there can be anyone who has not been appalled to see, hear and read about the killing of nine people, who were at Bible study in an African American Methodist Church in North Carolina, through various forms of the media. Moreover, what beggars belief was that the young man, who carried out this heinous crime, had earlier taken part in the Bible Study in that same church, but had carried a gun with the sole intention of killing 'Black' people, as he later revealed.

When I first heard of the event, my comment on Facebook included the observation that the reason for the perpetrator's action might well be far more complex than Race hatred and I was right! Further articles this week, have revealed something of this young man's situation. Reportedly, he had Black friends, had been a church goer since childhood, lived in a Trailer park, had taken drugs and exhibited anti- social behaviour etc. This however does not lessen the dastardly act of depriving the church, community and the Victims' families, of people who were making positive contributions to society.

In perspective, this crime is no more dreadful than those carried out on Christians, throughout the ages, up to present times, nor is it any more a shameful act than the killings at Belsen, and Dunblane, Young people at a camp in Europe more recently, ethnic cleansing, black on black killings and many more horrors that are brought to us in our sitting rooms, via TV, almost on a daily basis.

To return to the subject, that the killing was a racially motivated crime, we have to face the fact that racial injustice has not gone away. It is very much alive and kicking and permeates every strata of society and organisations, including our churches. The sad factor is that the UK 1962 Race Relation Act, aimed at eliminating Racial Discrimination, could not and cannot eliminate prejudice from the hearts of an undesirable number of people, even though they purport to be Christians; so much so that their sins are not only those of commission, but more often than not, those of omission, at the subconscious level.

We who profess to have a Methodist identity- black and white people, need to wake up and look into our hearts to see what we are doing that could perpetuate this unacceptable trait in the human situation and try to find ways in which we can truly call ourselves brothers and sisters in Christ and try to engender a spirit that enables us to love our neighbours, as ourselves!

Despite a 3,000 signature petition against wheelie bins in Ealing, the council has approved the proposal to bring them to the leafy borough.

Ealing Council's cabinet agreed proposals to increase recycling in the borough by introducing wheelie bins and switching to alternate weekly collections of refuse and

recycling.

The plans were approved by the council's cabinet on Tuesday (June 16) and are expected to be introduced in late spring next year.

The council claim that the new mixed recycling service will make it easier for people to recycle and help the council reach its target of recycling 50% of household waste by 2018.

However, the Tory opposition claim that over 3,000 Ealing residents signed their petition to tell the council that they don't want wheelie bins for rubbish and recycling.

Councillor David Millican said: "At last week's Northfield Ward Forum, in a show of hands, only two residents, out of the more than 75 who attended, said they wanted wheelie bins.

"I have been contacted by so many residents concerned that they will clutter up their front gardens, as there is nowhere else to store them; will damage cars as they manhandled through parked cars; will be difficult for older residents to manhandle. Ealing's Labour council must listen to residents' demands."

Most households that currently have the doorstep refuse and recycling service will be given two wheelie bins – one for refuse, which is currently disposed of in black sacks, and one for mixed recycling.

With the exception of food waste, residents will no longer be required to sort recycling into separate containers, but place it all in one wheelie bin which will be collected fortnightly.

The other wheelie bin for refuse will also be collected fortnightly on the week in-between recycling collections. Food waste will continue to be collected from the food waste bins every week.
