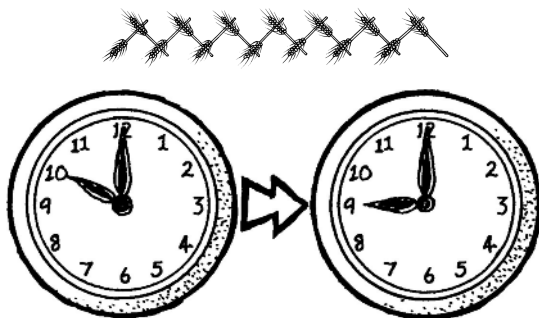
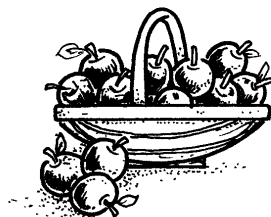

Dear friends

For me autumn is always a time of memories and taking stock. In the garden I'm harvesting some of the vegetables I planted in the spring and summer. As I do so I make a mental note of what did well and what struggled to help me plan for next year. Meanwhile catalogues are appearing in the letterbox and my email inbox with tempting images of bulbs and plants for next season. In all of this I look back to celebrate and evaluate and I look forward to plan and anticipate.

In church too we have a period of looking back and looking forward. We've just celebrated the Boys Brigade's 50th anniversary and what a joyous event that was with old friends and new gathering to pack the church. If you've had time to read the history of the company you will have noticed not only celebration but also times of review. Just like my garden, for the Boys Brigade to thrive as it does there have been times when its leaders have had to stop and evaluate and change their practice to fit the needs of the present age.

In a few weeks on the 15th October we will celebrate the centenary of the Kings Hall with our class meeting. This is a great event but it comes at a time when the congregations are outside their building and negotiations continue regarding that building's future development. Fresh vision and a willingness to move forward prayerfully will be needed if that building and community are to have a rich future building God's kingdom in the present age.

On the 9th October we will celebrate our harvest, bringing gifts for Hope for Southall Street Homeless, a charity that has been in existence only a year but that is already making a difference to the lives of individuals in Southall. As we celebrate harvest we remind ourselves once again of the riches of the world which God has created and all that we have been given. This abundance should overwhelm us. It should also spark our own generosity and wish to give in return. It's therefore a great time for us to review our own giving in terms of money, time and talents - the ways we work for God's kingdom inside and outside the church.

Can I ask you within this to consider your giving to the church, please? Many of you give sacrificially, reviewing your giving each year. Some of you may not have thought about your giving for sometime. It is very easy

for years to pass quickly with the amount given in standing orders and envelopes remaining the same. Can I ask you to wonder if your church giving has kept pace with the rest of your spending or are you still giving what you gave 10 years ago? If you don't already do so and you're a UK tax payer, would you consider gift aiding your offering so that we can claim the tax back?

Review and reflection was one of the the things identified by our vision process as necessary to our growth, life and vision as a church. To do so follows the rhythm of the life of the world God has created - springtime and harvest flow with their planting and picking, their preparing ground and clearing away the old.

May God grant us the vision and the strength to see those things which needs to be changed or cleared, to prepare the ground for new growth and may we move forwards into the coming years, building on the foundations of what has gone before.

from the Church Council

The most recent Church Council meeting took place on 21st September and was attended by 15 of its members and two observers.

The first topic of discussion was how we, as a church support the work of other organisations, principally charities such as All We Can, Action for Children, Christian Aid etc. In October 2014 the Council made a decision to stop holding special services or having 'slots' in services for charities. It also decided to consider alternative ways of supporting those charities, hence the discussion.

Information about charities we support is regularly included in the Messenger. One way of extending this would be to have displays and information available at events such as Traders Day. We could also organise after church 'bring and share' lunches to which speakers from charities could be invited. This could be done perhaps 3 – 4 times a year. However, this approach would only reach our own members and adherents. An alternative, and complementary approach would be to combine social events to which people from outside the church could be invited with providing information or inviting speakers from charities. Examples of this kind of event would be charity fashion

shows or quizzes. Following discussion it was decided to pursue the idea of a charity social event some time during the spring in support of All We Can.

Turning to finance, Derek Matthews reported that the church had ended the last financial year (which runs from 1st September to 31st August each year) with a surplus of about £21,000. This reflected very strong lettings income, offertory income having remained pretty much static. In line with the church's Reserves Policy it was decided to transfer £17,750 to the Major Repairs Fund.

We still have to decide on how to use the legacy left to the church by Peter Loveridge. Some ideas were floated at the meeting:

- A set of Revised Standard Version study bibles for use in bible studies
- Book stand for use at communion
- Small brass cross for the communion table (*replacing one stolen in 2007*)

We were asked to bring ideas (with costs) to the next meeting for decision, so if you have any suggestions, please let Rachel know before the next meeting which will be in early December.

Council also agreed to a request from the King's Hall Class Meeting to release £700 from the funds held for them by Kingsdown to support the King's Hall centenary celebrations on 15th October at Hambrough Primary School (next to King's Hall). This money will be pooled with equal amounts from the King's Hall Urdu/Hindi church and the Circuit to meet the cost of the celebrations. Details of the celebrations are published in the current edition of In-touch and in our regular News Sheet. People are needed to help set up the event from 12.00pm and to clear away afterwards from 5.30pm – if you can help, please speak to Rachel.

On property matters, the Council decided to replace the fluorescent lighting in the Arena and hall with LED fittings. These will be much more economical to run. The Arena will be tackled first as the cages protecting the current light fittings are not in good condition. The Property Committee will make the final decision on contractors and will organise the timing of the work.

The meeting expressed its thanks to all the people involved in looking after our church premises including the various people who undertake maintenance tasks, deal with lettings and look after the church finances. We all owe a great debt of thanks to them for their work.

The Mission & Outreach Committee reported that we had been asked to participate in the Ealing Churches Winter Night Shelter again this year. Council agreed that we should subject to there being sufficient volunteers, particularly for the overnight shifts. Sue Barton will again act as Co-ordinator for Kingsdown. The Shelter will operate on the four Sunday nights leading up to, but not including Christmas Day.

The committee also made some recommendations about the regular Book Fairs. In order to re-focus the fairs more towards outreach and to provide scope for other types of stall (eg Traidcraft, plants etc) Council agreed that the quantity of books should be reduced by about 50%. This will also reduce the heavy work of moving and stacking the books. As the Book Fairs were considered to be part of the church's outreach, it was also decided to abolish the admission charge as this was felt to be inconsistent with 'outreach'. In future, reports detailing the amounts raised will be itemised by the type of stall (books, cakes, bric-à-brac, refreshments etc. This will help keep each element under review.

Finally, the committee recommended that consideration be given to the frequency of the

Book Fairs, possibly reducing from 6 to 4 per annum. However, as dates had already been set for 2016 – 17 there will be no reduction in the coming year. First, the Council wants to see how the re-focussed fairs go. In addition, account will be taken of how well participants feel they can sustain the current number of fairs.

Turning to worship, a further Worship Consultation is to be arranged, although the date had not yet been fixed. Christmas Day this year falls on a Sunday and services will be as follows:

11th Dec 10.30am Christmas Family Parade service

18th Dec 6.00pm Carol service

24th Dec 11.15pm Midnight communion

25th Dec 10.00am Christmas Morning Worship

We are awaiting a response from Lodge Bros regarding sponsorship of the Memorial Carol Service, so look out for further news.

Jill Richardson has suggested putting together a list of ministers for display in the church. Council agreed that ministers back to the point when the church became Kingsdown Methodist Church (c 1959) will be researched.

Finally, Rachel Bending said that she would be taking a sabbatical from April – June 2017. Rachel is committed to working as a presbyter in London, so as a great contrast she intends to spend some time considering deserts as silent places. The Circuit will provide support to the church during Rachel's sabbatical and was forming a Sabbatical Support Committee. Offers were requested for people to join the committee.

The next Church Council meeting will be held on Tuesday 6th December at 8.00pm.

THE BOYS' BRIGADE'S 50TH BIRTHDAY CHURCH PARADE

The 50th Birthday Church Parade of 10th Ealing Boys' Brigade was an event two years in the planning, but which was worth every second of preparation. Old Boys, ex-officers and friends travelled from all corners of the kingdom to meet up with their comrades and colleagues, to give thanks, to parade, and to enjoy a day of unabashed nostalgia.

We had hoped to have a congregation of perhaps 150 to celebrate but, as it turned out, over 250 people filled our church to capacity and then



some. We had to put out extra rows of chairs at the back of the church and also add seats to the end of each pew to meet demand, causing the opening of the service to be delayed by almost ten minutes while everyone claimed their place. Finally, with the BB Senior Boys squeezed into the

choir pews, the worship began and the assembled number raised the roof for the next 80 minutes.

There were so many surprise guests it would be impossible to name even half of them but amongst those in attendance were Anthony Keast and Clive Pennells (Company founders); Peter Watkins and Mike Camp-Overy; Bill and Marj Davies, with Joanne; Jason, Mark and Susan Young; Hamilton Lee, Mark Goodchild and Michael Clarke; David Bartram, Mark Thompson, David Tebbutt, Stephen Antoine and Ralph Pirie-Lewis; Paul Copas, Gary Douthwaite and Mark Cronin; the Griffiths/Blackledge family; Linda Maynard Castle; Graham, Fran and Clare Pike; Les and Gwen Goodchild; and also 50 current serving Boys from the 10th, which is the most we've ever had at a church parade.

Amongst the joyous singing and prayer, we also found time to wallow in memories, as David Lane and Tony Plews wandered the church with microphones inviting the old-timers to reminisce about their time in the 10th, which was followed by a short poignant film showing the history of the Company through 50 different photographs -- one for each year. Many of the memories brought loud laughter and some brought quiet tears as the viewers remembered their own childhoods.



During the prayers, Mark Tobias and David Lane read the 10th Ealing Roll of Honour, recalling before the congregation and before God those who had served and passed into Glory. Revd Rachel Bending spoke to the current membership encouragingly, inviting them to put on God's armour as they sought to be Christian soldiers.



The service was followed by a parade, and our band (London's best) led the Company followed by scores of Old Boys and their families around the block -- it was a glorious sight to behold. And then, with the formalities done, we all filed

into the church hall for the festivities. Drinks and birthday cake were served amidst laughter and chat, as the throng pored over the hundreds of photographs that lined an entire wall and also looked through the tables of trophies and memorabilia.

Mention must be made of the ladies of the catering team who provided heroic service throughout the event -- Thank You!



Current Kingsdown members were delighted to see so many old familiar faces and, once again, tears flowed in amongst the jollity and laughter. By 2:30 pm, all was done (bar the tidying) and the doors were closed. It was a day that will long be remembered by all

who were able to attend. Thanks to all who contributed to this very special day of thanksgiving and celebration. And here's to the next 50 years!

Laura Cook Reports on the ‘P’ word

When we watch news scenes of bloodshed and destruction in Syria, and as images of dust-covered children sat in the back of ambulances stunned and glassy-eyed remind us of the awfulness of war we can sometimes wonder whether there is any way we can make a difference.

We speak of potential and yet in such dire circumstances surely all hope feels lost. Yet, in the middle of a children’s group in Husn Camp, a petite



girl dressed in electric pink stood up and read a speech filled with passion and hope and yearning for a better future. Hiba’s voice shook as she spoke of home, “the war burned everything” she said. But as she talked her voice swelled with courage and she started to express the

encouragement she had found through this children’s group, known as the Child Forum.

She spoke of her talent for poetry being nurtured and she smiled timidly. For girls like Hiba the forum, run by one **All We Can’s** partners in Jordan, had been a source of strength and psychological support. A hub for learning, discussion, friendship, and perhaps most importantly fun. Hiba had lost so much in Syria, through her words I discovered she had been bereaved of her father and her home, but resiliently she also spoke of what she had gained.

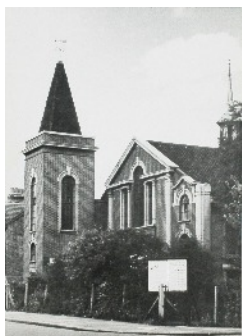

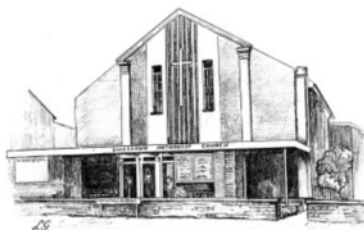

Losing Christianity in the Middle East is 'hammer blow'

Prince Hassan bin Talal of Jordan has said losing Christianity in the Middle East would be a "hammer blow" which would "destroy the richness of the tapestry" of the area.

He wrote an article with Ed Kessler, a high profile Jew and founder of the Woole Institute, in the *Telegraph*. In it Prince Hassan condemns Islamic State saying he is "appalled by the sickening attacks on our fellow human beings.

We also know that to lose Christianity from its birthplace would be to destroy the richness of the tapestry of the Middle East and a hammer blow to our shared heritage," he said. "The reality is that we are all one community, united by shared beliefs and history. But this is increasingly denied, with Islamic State in Iraq and the Levant taking the lead both in justifying and carrying out these attacks." The pair say it is "abhorrent to us, as a Muslim and a Jew, to see Christianity and Christians under such savage assault across our region".

The letter adds: "Christianity has been part of the essential fabric of the Middle East for two thousand years. Far from being a Western import as some, incredibly, now seem to suggest, it was born here and exported as a gift to the rest of the world. Christian communities have been intrinsic to the development of Arab culture and civilisation.

Inter-faith work is the only way to end this dangerous slide towards hatred and self-destruction."

Happy Birthday Winnie the Pooh

– a much loved bear

Winnie-the-Pooh was born 90 years ago this month, on 14 October, 1926 – in the sense that this was the date on which the world-famous children's book by A.A. Milne was first published. Technically, Winnie-the-Pooh, also called Pooh Bear, is a fictional anthropomorphic teddy bear hero of a number of books, always illustrated by E.H. Shepard, who therefore gave Pooh his distinctive shape in the mind of the reader.



To his many admirers, Pooh is the wise, kind and loving companion they always wanted – a bear of very little brain and with many faults, but whose heart is always in the right place. The Pooh stories, written originally for the author's only son, Christopher Robin, and set in an area recognisable as Ashdown Forest in Sussex, have been translated into many languages, including a Latin version, *Winnie ille Pu*.

Though naive and somewhat literal-minded, honey-loving Pooh composes songs and hums and comes up with unexpected solutions to problems. He also invents the game Poohsticks. He has been recommended to Christians for his love toward his friends, such as Piglet, Tigger, Kanga and Rabbit – all modelled on Christopher Robin's soft toys.

Examples of Pooh's wisdom are widely quoted. His refusal to let Piglet worry him can be seen as deeply Christian: "Supposing a tree fell down, Pooh, while we were underneath it?" "Supposing it didn't," said Pooh after careful thought. **

Ofcom, the media watchdog, has issued some sombre warnings based on a recent survey of national internet habits:

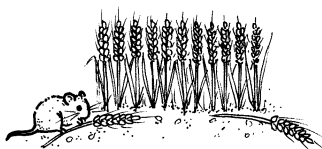


- More than half (59%) of all 50 million internet users in the UK say they are addicted to surfing the web. *(That includes 45 per cent of the over-65 age group who are using the internet.)*

- We now spend an average of more than 24 hours each week online. - Huge numbers of us have neglected housework, been late for work, and even walked into people on the street, because we simply could not put down our digital devices.

The internet is damaging our social and working lives. Around a third of us have avoided friends and family in order to stay online, while a quarter of teenagers are late for school because they are online. A third of us have attempted a 'digital detox'.

- Meanwhile, a quarter of adults admit to sending a text or instant messages to someone in the same room as themselves while at home.

St FRANCIS

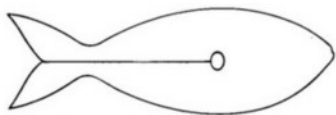
