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Well, hello, Ealing Trinity Circuit! I am looking forward to being part of the circuit staff for the coming year, and getting to know the people of Kingsdown and Ealing Green churches. I've been asked to write something to introduce myself, so what to say without giving you a boring life history. So let me try and anticipate a few questions you might ask.

### You are an Anglican – what brings you to the Methodist circuit?

Although it is true that I have been a member of the Anglican Church for the last 38 years, my previous church affiliation was very varied and included open Brethren and Baptist churches. I have never seen myself as exclusively Anglican and have always been active ecumenically.

I have had links with the Ealing circuit for many years, firstly through the healing services, which I started to attend over 20 years ago, joining the team a couple of years later, which in turn led to taking services on the circuit, in more recent years just at Greenford and Northolt churches. I have also done some training for the circuit and feel very much at home in Methodist circles.



## You are a Lay Minister. How did that come about?

My involvement in ministry goes back a long way. Since I became a committed Christian in my teens, I cannot remember a time when I haven't been an active church member. While my children were growing up, the sense of call to more formal ministry began to grow, and, after exploring ordination initially, I was commissioned as a lay minister at my local church in Greenford in 1996, and, after 5 happy years in that role, I started the St Albans

and Oxford Ministry Training Course and was licensed as an Accredited Lay Minister in 2004.

#### What does it mean?

Essentially, I have done the same selection process and training as an Anglican priest or Methodist minister, but feel my calling is to minister as

a lay person, focusing my service on pastoral work, training and development, and encouraging people to discover, develop and use their God-given gifts. Essentially, all I cannot do in the Methodist Church is preside at communion services.

In addition to being licensed over the years to three different churches, and taking Methodist services, I worked for the London Diocese for  $6\frac{1}{2}$  years, organising and running training courses in pastoral care, discipleship and leadership among other things. Three years ago my post was made redundant due to a staff restructuring. Since then I have continued to minister at St Cuthbert's, North Wembley, and to do some bits of training on a freelance basis.

Another thread that has weaved in over the years is a ministry of support to a number of people through spiritual direction. For those of you unfamiliar with the term, it means listening to and accompanying people as they reflect on their personal journey of faith and prayer. It is a ministry I love and find a great privilege, offering as it does, the space for people to explore in some depth what it means for them to live in relationship with God. To me that process is at the heart of understanding our shared calling to serve Christ in the world.

## How do you relax?

A great support in all I do is my lovely family, my husband Andy and two grown up children, both working and living away from us now, happily settled in Oxford and Birmingham, though we see them often. At the time of writing we are looking forward to our daughter's wedding on 26th August.

I love Scrabble and board games, sudoku, walking, cycling and gardening (though rather spasmodically and more by instinct than skill!)

### How do you feel about coming?

Excited and nervous in equal measure! Mostly, though, it is a real joy to be offered this opportunity to work with you over the coming year and I hope that we will be able to grow together as we share in worship, prayer and service. Watch this space!

September brings a huge host of mixed feelings as I begin my role as circuit superintendent and cease to be your minister.

I have valued my time as your minister: the times of joy and laughter, the struggles and hard discussions and the privilege of sharing in high and low points of your lives. I know there will be things that each of you will wish I'd done differently. I hope there will be things that each of you have found helpful, enriching or enlivening. The shared ministry of congregation and minister is always one of unfulfillable expectations- our end goal is the Kingdom of God after all! Thank you for your care and support, for your presence and hard work, for your willingness to be challenged and to change.



I pray that you continue to allow yourselves to be open to change, that you continue to search for God's will and vision for God's people in Kingsdown. I hope that you continue to grow in grace in your relationships with one another- learning to allow your differences to strengthen your community.

Thank you so much for the warm words, joyful lunch and generous gifts that marked my last Holy Communion on 20 August.

# From the General Church Meeting and the Church Council

This year's General Church Meeting was held on 9th July following the morning service. The meeting was held rather later than usual because Rev Rachel Bending was away on sabbatical during April – June. The most recent Church Council meeting was held on 27th July.

During the morning service on 9th the congregation heard July, reports about the work of Boys Brigade, Babies & Toddlers, the Kinasdown Club. the Ealina Churches Winter Night Shelter and Ealing Foodbank. Thanks were expressed to those running the Book Fairs. In addition, the number of people who have official roles or who carry out various tasks around the church was highlighted and they were thanked for their dedication and work.

The formal meeting following the service was attended by 24 members and adherents. The meeting elected the following as church officers and members of the Church Council. All were confirmed during the Church Council on 27<sup>th</sup> July.

Note that only full members of the Methodist Church can serve on the Church Council.

Emily Campbell would like to stand down as a church steward, but has agreed to continue pending the appointment of a new steward to replace her.

Esther Ackah, George Lafford (King's Hall), Derek Matthews and Janet Smith will serve as Kingsdown's representatives on the Circuit Meeting.

The following were also confirmed in their various roles, although these do not form part of the Church Council:

Vestry Stewards: Kathleen Loveridge, Jill Richardson Communion Stewards: Violet Cordon, Ivy Hanson, Jill Richardson, Rita Safta, Janet Smith, Eileen Tobias, MWiB Representative Jill Richardson

Kathleen Loveridge asked about the advertising of committee meeting dates. Committee Secretaries were asked to ensure their meeting dates were advised to the Messenger and News-sheet compilers. Meeting dates (when known) also appear on the church website.

Kingsdown's 60th anniversary falls in 2019. Rachel Bending suggested we start thinking about how we might celebrate the anniversary.

The Church Council on 27<sup>th</sup> July was attended by 14 members (from a total of 19 in all).

Rachel Bending announced that Penny Pedley had been appointed Associate Pastor for Kingsdown and Ealing Green with effect from 1st September. Penny is an Anglican Lay Minister with many years experience. She is known in the Circuit as a member of the Healing Team at Greenford and has preached at several of our churches. Whilst Penny will have oversight of Kingsdown, Rachel will continue as minister for the King's Hall Class Meeting.

Rachel outlined the procedure for 'stationing' ministers to churches and what is included in church profiles. These are descriptions of churches and their requirements – Rachel said these needed to be 'positively realistic'. The stewards of Kingsdown and Ealing Green were to meet with Rev Shirlyn Toppin on 3rd August to draw up their church profiles. In discussion the meeting felt Kingsdown's profile should include:

- Need for stability
- Need for the minister to have pastoral and supportive skills
- Need for the minister to be engaged and pragmatic
- Need for help to focus on core mission of the church – help to make church approachable and relevant
- Need for help to develop variations on how we do 'church'

On finance, Derek Matthews reported that, based on the first 9 months of the year Kingsdown would have a surplus of about £20k for the full year. Most of this would be transferred to the Major Repairs Fund.

The Heinz Chapel Choir concert in May generated a surplus of about £900 (£600 from tickets plus the £300 donation from the choir). It was suggested that a portion of this

should be donated to the Ealing Churches Winter Night Shelter. Information will be requested from the Night Shelter as to their needs and a decision made at the next meeting. Thanks were expressed to Pam and Alan Smith for their work in organising the concert.

The budget for 2017-18 will be presented to the Council at the next meeting. Derek pointed out that there will be a 5% increase in assessments for all churches in the Circuit – these are the payments churches make to finance their ministers and the running of the Circuit. Furthermore, the Circuit will be increasing assessments in the coming years as it works towards financial break-even over the next 5 years.

It is intended to register Kingsdown as a charity in its own right with the Charities Commission during the Autumn. Until now churches have generally been able to operate as charities without registering, but this arrangement is being withdrawn and all churches must now register as charities in their own right.

Janet Smith presented a Property Report to the meeting. Unfortunately, the contractor for the completion of the fire alarm system was not responding to calls. A new quote is being obtained and will be discussed at Property Committee with a view to presenting new proposals to the next meeting of the Church Council.

A report was presented on the maintenance of the wooden floors in the hall, hall foyer and church foyer. The best quote was from Kleaneffect for £3,300 for either an annual or a twice-yearly clean and maintenance. The meeting decided to accept this quote, but asked Property Committee to determine whether this should be annually or twice yearly depending on the practicality of scheduling the work given the overall use of our church premises.

In addition, the meeting decided that the following items of work should be undertaken at a total gross cost of approximately £5,000.:

Replacement of flooring in the choir vestry with carpet tiles.

Re-fixing or replacing the flooring in the Dome Room with the carpet tiles (if the quote for re-fixing is similar to that for replacing. Property Committee to decide which should be chosen).

Repair plastering in corridor leading to the hall.

Repairs to wall in the men's toilet (hall).

Finally on property matters, a Fire Risk Assessment of our church premises had been completed. This had highlighted a number of issues which would be discussed at Property Committee.

On behalf of the Mission & Outreach Committee Olwen Britton reported that:

- Kingsdown had raised £119 towards the Easter Offering with the total for the Circuit being £1,460.
- The Quilt Exhibition at Ealing Green had raised £127 for Mind and £71 for Mercy Ships.
- Book Fairs had raised £360 in March, £400 in May and £270 in July. They will be further Book Fairs in September and November.

Proposals are needed for the next Charity of the Year. It was suggested that Ealing Churches Winter Night Shelter or Welshore Hub should be considered.

The meeting decided that we would participate in the Ealing Churches Winter Night Shelter again this winter by hosting the Shelter on four Sunday nights in the run-up to Christmas. Anyone interested in volunteering to help in some way should speak to Sue Barton who will

be coordinating the Shelter at Kingsdown.

It was noted that Deacon Lemia Nkwelah would like to extend the MHA Ealing Live at Home scheme to include activities at Kingsdown.

Our Pastoral Visitors will be asked to indicate needs that the scheme could address. It was felt, however that any extension of the scheme to Kingsdown should take account of our existing activities (eg Kingsdown Club) and the current use of space in our premises.

Unfortunately, the Northflelds Fayre on 15th July had been a wash-out on account of bad weather. However, Rachel Bending recommended that we continue our involvement with 'Love Northfield' at their Christmas event. This will be on Saturday 9th December.

An organiser is required for our Festival of Nativities this Christmas. This would involve organising the nativities in time for the Love Northfield Christmas event, arranging rotas (a sign-up sheet should be sufficient) and contacting Little Ealing and Fielding Schools and the Corner House Nursery to arrange their visits to the Festival.

This was Rachel's last meeting as chair of Kingsdown's Church Council. However, she is likely to pop up from time to time at our Council meetings in her new role as Superintendent Minister.

Finally, don't forget the Circuit Welcome Service at Acton Hill on Sunday 3<sup>rd</sup> September at 6.30pm. The service will welcome Deacon Ramona Samuel and her husband Calvin Samuel (Principal of the London School of Theology) to our Circuit as well as welcoming Penny


Pedley as Associate Pastor for Kingsdown and Ealing Green.

Over the past year families visiting have remained good, with an average of 12/14 attending regularly. Parents, grandparents, child minders, and nannies with their children are all made welcome.




This year, from our weekly fees, we have purchased a ball pool which has been a great hit with all ages - mostly up to two years, but a few older children with their siblings also attend.

# Harvest Appeal September 2017

Zimbabwe is beautiful. It is full of life. It was once the bread basket of Africa. Now people struggle to grow enough food because of insufficient rainfall. Zimbabwe is beautiful, but many of the people who live there are suffering the effects of poverty.

This is Regai and her family, including her eldest son Valentine. When Valentine was an infant, he was left in the care of his sister. He was asleep in his bed. His sister started a fire and the whole house caught alight. Their neighbours came to the house and heard Valentine crying. He was hidden under the bed. They rescued him.



When Regai came home, she saw her house had burnt down and went straight to hospital. She explains what it was like, "They had put him on drips. He was burnt all over his head and it was swollen. It looked like it was going to burst. It was very painful. We were isolated in a room because of his condition. I wasn't allowed to leave. It felt like I was in prison. No one had thought that he would survive. It is painful to think about what happened".

Regai's husband passed away in 2005, making her life even more difficult. "I was unable to pay for my children to finish school", she explains, "I was

here, working my land like other people in the community. If I had no food, I would have to work in other people's fields".

All We Can is bringing hope into situations like Regai's, by bringing communities together in Central Zimbabwe, to start new businesses, in order to help families make an income and provide for their needs. Regai met with other members of her community, and with All We Can's support, they decided to start a chicken business because they thought this would earn them the money they needed. They received seven days of training on how to run their chicken business. Regai hopes, "That by the end of the year my life will be improved. My children will go to school and have enough food to eat".

Valentine appreciates the sacrifices his mum has made. He says, "All of the decisions she makes are for the good of us, her children. She knows that this project will help support us. I hope that if I pass school, I'll be able to find work and support my mum. Thanking her for all that she has done for me."

Our donations really do make a difference. A gift of £21 would provide a community with 20 chickens, helping them to kick start their business and earn an income so they can provide their families with food and education. A monthly donation to All We Can will go further. For example, by giving £10 a month you can ensure that more communities, like the one we met today, can survive the tough challenges that they face and improve their lives, not only for them, but for future generations. ## Methodists respond to cholera outbreak in Yemen

As Yemen continues to struggle with one of the largest cholera outbreaks in recent recorded history, the Methodist relief and development agency 'All We Can' has extended its work in the country.

A recent joint statement of the World Health Organisation and Unicef warned that suspected cholera cases in Yemen could exceed 600,000 by the end of 2017. Yemen's health systems are collapsing. Water, sanitation and access to food is precarious. It is now estimated that 18.8 million of Yemen's 28 million people need humanitarian assistance and over seven million are on the brink of famine.

As a result of generous giving to its East Africa Famine Appeal, over £450,000 was raised for its East Africa Famine Appeal, and 2000 very vulnerable people in Yemen are benefiting from the distribution of food baskets. ## 'England's Rose'

This month marks 20 years since the funeral of Princess Diana on 6th September 1997. Recently Prince William described how his mother's death was like an earthquake, the shockwaves taking time to sink in. When we remember the days leading up to the funeral, the whole nation seemed touched by her death. Over 32 million people watched the funeral on television. As we look back to this event, what is its continuing significance?

As those made in the image of God, we are called to reach out to show love to others. 'Dear friends, let us love one another, for love comes from God.' (1 John 4:7). Princess Diana did this, especially the vulnerable in our society, remembering especially her work with AIDS sufferers and landmine victims. However, she was also a flawed individual, who fought various 'demons' in her own life and struggled with relationships. People identified with her humanity as one like us: fallible, weak yet more than good enough.

There is always something powerful about vulnerability in others; we can identify with them because, like us, they don't have it all together. God uses flawed people in his purposes, as we clearly see in the pages of the Bible: Abraham, Moses, David and Paul, to mention just a few!

Ironically, Mother Theresa died the day before Diana's funeral. Again, she was somebody who was much loved for her work among the poor. However, despite being declared a saint last year, she openly talked about the vulnerability of her faith. Mother Teresa revealed that she spent nearly 50 years without a tangible feeling of God's presence in her life! It's not easy to be a perfect saint!

THE WAY I SEE IT: The Blame Game

'It's her fault!' That, along with 'it's not fair!' is among the first sentences most children learn. Something's been broken, someone's in tears, and the Blame Game has begun. The awful truth is, we don't grow out of it. Look at any newspaper or watch daytime television and you'll see it played out endlessly.

Years ago, a battle-hardened journalist told me that 'in news there are no accidents'. Of course, in fact there are. But after every well-publicised incident the media and aggrieved parties ensure that the endless hunt for someone – anyone – to blame and punish goes on, even if it takes years.

When the tower in Siloam fell, the crowds didn't ask Jesus who was to blame (they simply assumed it was an 'act of God'). They wanted to know if the 18 victims were particular sinners, to suffer such a fate. No, he said, they weren't – though they should all amend their ways. The crowd weren't concerned with blame, but consequence. It sometimes seems we've reversed that, in the modern world, and replaced consequence with blame. Somehow it will all be better if someone is punished – or is made to pay heavy compensation.

Every time we say the Lord's Prayer we ask for forgiveness, but add 'as we forgive those who sin against us'. It may well be their fault, but we are not seeking a penalty for it. That seems a healthy, if radical, alternative to the Blame Game.

## SAVE OUR HOSPITALS

With no blue-light A&E, no maternity, no children's ward, no acute beds and an 80% reduction in beds overall, no local resident will recognise the husk - run by GPs, not consultants - that will be left at Ealing under these proposals as a 'hospital'.

To argue that what will remain is a 'local' hospital is the biggest con of all.



At a time when Ealing's population is growing and the pressures on the local NHS are already so acute, stripping away vital services and capacity is nonsensical. A&E waiting times in north west London are already amongst the worst in the country and these proposals threaten to make that worse.

I'd urge Ealing residents to show their opposition to these reckless plans by signing the petition to the government, urging them to think again and save Ealing and Charing Cross hosptials.





Gabriel is best known for his appearing to a young Jewish girl named Mary to tell her that she will give birth to Jesus.
