The verse also came top in Chile, France, Italy, the Netherlands, Peru, South Africa, Spain and the United States.



The social committee started it all off with a get together on 1st December where my best memory was trying Philippino puddings for the first time. This was soon to be followed by the putting up of the Kingsdown collection of Nativity Sets. Thank you to all of those who put them up, and took them down, and also to all of those who assisted me in showing them to Infant School children on various days all week.

I was not prepared for how effective this was as an activity for youngsters. I expected them to react to the sets as though they were toys. In the event there was awe and wonderment. The children knew they were special and treated the tiny figures accordingly. It was a really good opportunity to rehearse the Christmas story with them. The extent to which they already knew it was apparent though – especially when I started asking where Joseph was – meaning my own little figure - only to be told that he isn't here, he's in a different class"!. The speaker meant the little boy who was playing Joseph in the school nativity.

We opened the church to youngsters from the community on the Saturday after schools had been in, but children did not come. Maybe we need to think again on that one next year? My husband Phil very much enjoyed making Christmas decorations with Sue and Rita though, so the art materials, at least in part, were used!

On the Sunday our very own junior church children brought the story alive to us in word, action and song. Thank you, children, and to your leaders! It was lovely to watch and definitely one of the best I have seen! You are obviously stars in the making!

Then came our carol service, midnight communion and Christmas morning services. It was a blessing to share the story of the incarnation with you, and to reflect with you in different ways.

Through all of this time the Night Shelter was taking place each Sunday evening in our hall. A meeting of people, all of us different, seeing God within one another. I will not quickly forget my discussion about prayer with one of the guests who told me "The mistake people make with prayer is to think that it is about changing God's mind. It is not about God listening to us and us changing Him, but about us listening to God and being changed by Him". Reflect on that one yourself. It has kept me going all month. What might God be trying to say to you? How might he be trying to change you? ... Both as an individual; and as a church.

In fact, that was what I challenged you to reflect upon at our annual covenant service this year. I asked you to reflect on "Why do I come to church"? and "What is the purpose of our church?".

I have been at the church a few months now and met and am beginning to know many of you. It IS an active church where people have and put ideas into practice. What Kingsdown needs now though is a group of people who are prepared to work with me to pull the church together.... To think about a way forward together. Our stewards are committed but very much in need of support. Please think prayerfully about whether you could join the team? Do not think about why you couldn't, but why you could. We can work round any difficulties you have. Now is the time to come forward, when we have at least a few years of stability ahead of us to work together as a team. Contact me and let me know what YOU can offer. Of course, the stewards are not managing to get everything done now, there are not enough of them. Only YOU can help to make that better so please do.

In the short term I would really like to hear from people who would be prepared to think about putting together an away day – or even an away day at home – for the church to focus on our life together. Be in touch if you think you can help me with this.

One last request which might appeal to somebody ...? I have been asked by the Chestnut Lodge Care Home (not far from Pitshanger Methodist Church) to provide pastoral care, and perhaps a service, for Protestant Residents in the home. These residents have dementia and tend to enjoy relatively short visits. I also give them communion when I visit, and they want it. My time is limited though, and I would therefore love to hear

from anyone who can assist me with the visiting? Please have a think and let me know.

So, a few things to think about at the beginning of this New Year. My ears are open too ... so let me know any thoughts, or ideas, or requests that you have, and we will continue to move forward together.

June was a member of Kingsdown for 30 years. In the early stages, when she was travelling and working she was not involved in the life of the Church.

However, when she retired she became an active member, on Committees, Sunday School and generally giving help where it was required.

June was born near Wrexham in Wales. She left that area at a very young age to start a nursing career in Sheffield. Passionate about babies and children she took a job with Save the Children and travelled extensively, to often very remote areas of the World. Borneo, Papua New Guinea, as well as the USA. Australia and Europe.

She travelled to Sri Lanka many times to support a girls' orphanage and also a local family. She was extremely generous as were members of Kingsdown who, when they knew she was going to Sri Lanka donated gifts and clothes for the girls in the orphanage. How she managed to sweet talk the airline officials with the very overweight cases, I will never know?

For the past years she worked for the NHS in Islington, dealing with babies and local toddlers. She ran clinics and visited families giving help and advice, particularly to new parents. She wrote a monthly newsletter and several books, always with reference to babies and toddlers.

She was sometimes outspoken, proud of her Welsh heritage Methodism and travel. Two years' ago she moved back to Wrexham, and after another visit to Sri Lanka became ill with sepsis, from which she she never recovered.

June passed away on the 18th December 2018.

Practice Emergency Evacuation

We finally held a practice emergency evacuation during the morning service on 20th January. So, how did we do? Guidelines state that we should be able to evacuate the building within 2½ minutes. That includes Junior Church coming down from upstairs. The church was evacuated in about 2 minutes - a little less than the guidelines require. From that point of view we did well. There were a couple of immediate issues arising from the practice, however. Firstly, the order to evacuate wasn't very loud, although if a fire happened for real the alarm would certainly be raised more definitely. Secondly, the Junior Church upstairs did not hear the order to evacuate so there was a delay relaying it to them. That said, the building was still cleared within the guidelines.

The following is a reminder of the procedure as far as the congregation on a Sunday morning is concerned:-

- If the alarm is raised, leave as quickly as possible via the double doors at the back of the church and exit the building through the main entrance doors onto Kingsdown Avenue, ie go back out the way you came in.
- Leave personal belongings behind don't waste time gathering bags or coats, just leave as quickly as possible.

Remember that no item is as valuable as your life

- Assemble in front of the shops near the corner of Kingsdown and Northfield Avenues opposite the church and await instructions.
- Do not re-enter the building until you are told it is safe to do so.
- If you are unable to move quickly, move to the end of your pew towards the centre of the church the stewards will come to assist you out of the building. Please do not impede other people the objective is to get as many people out as quickly as possible.

As a constant reminder, there is a blue 'Fire Action' notice on the wall on the left as you enter at the main entrance to the church foyer.

The full Emergency Evacuation Plan is posted on the notice board in the church foyer. This details the various escape routes around the building, considerations relating to other users of the building, the location and types of fire extinguisher available etc. If anyone would like a copy of the full plan please let me know and I will e-mail or print you a copy.


Does this make you feel uncomfortable?

INDONESIA EMERGENCY APPEAL



All We Can and The Methodist Church in Britain are supporting the people of Indonesia, following the destruction caused by the earthquake and tsunami on Sulawesi on 28 September 2018 and the devastation caused to the Sunda Strait on 22 December 2018.



- On Friday 28 September, a deadly earthquake struck Indonesia which triggered a tsunami. Waves, more than three metres high, swept across the land destroying almost everything in their wake. More than 2000 people lost their lives, more than 40,000 people are displaced and up to 1.5 million have been affected. Supplies of food, water and shelter continue to be urgently needed.
- On Saturday 22 December, a tsunami, believed to be caused by undersea landslides triggered by the new eruptions of the Anak Krakatau volcano, crashed into villages on the strait that separates the Indonesian islands of Java and Sumatra. This tsunami wave destroyed buildings and homes along the coast. Hundreds of people are injured, and the death toll continues to rise as the full scale of the disaster becomes clear.

Psalm 95's wise words on worship

'Man's chief end is to glorify God and to enjoy him forever' (Westminster Confession). We are created to worship, but who or what will we worship? Psalm 95 invites us to worship God and to engage with His presence and power.

Rejoicing in God (1-5): 'Come, let us sing for joy to the Lord.' (v1). In worship we are called to praise God through 'singing, shouting and extolling', because He is our king (3), creator (4) and rock (1). He truly has the whole world in His hands, including you and me! Whatever our circumstances, worship enables us to acknowledge his sovereignty over our lives.

Reverence before God (6,7): 'Come, let us bow down in worship, let us kneel before the Lord our Maker.' (v6). Worship brings us into the place of submission before God. The NT word for worship means 'to prostrate' ourselves before Him. It challenges the counterfeit 'gods' in our lives eg. power, money, sex, work etc., as well as calling us to trust Him in whatever we are facing, as He is a loving shepherd who cares for us.

Responding to God (8-11): 'Today, if only you would hear His voice, do not harden your hearts as you did...in the wilderness,' (v8,9). Our worship enables us to listen and hear God's voice. He has a fresh word to speak into our lives on a daily basis. Unlike the people of Israel in the wideness, we are warned not to harden our hearts, but to embrace God's new life. The test of genuine worship is not whether it feels good or fits our taste, but does is lead to greater obedience in our lives.

Johann Sebastian Bach headed all his compositions with S.D.G. ie 'Soli Dei Gratia', which means 'To God alone be the glory'.



May we be faithful and guard against the same fate that befell the Laodicean Church.

The Faithful True Witness sees into His church, He stands alone not wanted inside, Contented and useless, neither hot or cold, A complacent church more dead than alive. 'O Laodicea, can you not see?
You say you are rich, but I know you are poor,
Come buy from Me, I have all that you need'

Have you ever wondered whether there was something more meaningful

you could do with the money sitting in your savings account? Well, microfinance charities help you invest your pounds and pennies in worthwhile causes. Unlike a donation to charity, you get your money back, so although the loan won't provide you with interest, it means money that would be gathering dust - or, as the Bible says, destroyed by moths - can be put to better use.



Take Miriam, for example. She owns a small hairdressing business in Chipadze, Zimbabwe. Alongside two other hairdresser friends she is requesting a £906 loan to re-stock the weaves, wigs and other quality hair products she sells to clients. She's planning on using the profits to expand her business. You could have loaned Miriam part of the £906 she needed for her new venture or the whole amount, and can expect to be repaid within six months. Once you receive your loan back you can reinvest it in another small entrepreneur or put it back into your savings account....to gather some more dust.

Saint Valentine's Day, many believe, was named after one or more Christian martyrs and was established by Pope Gelasius 1 in 496 AD. Valentine of Rome was martyred about 269, and this day usually 'belongs' to him.

The first recorded association of Valentine Day with romantic love (1382) is from Geoffrey Chaucer. He wrote, 'For this was Saint Valentine's Day, when every bird cometh there to choose his mate.' This poem was in honour of the first anniversary of the engagement of King Richard II of England to Anne of Bohemia. Valentine Day is referred to by Ophelia in Hamlet (1600-1601).

10 frugal, food waste busting New Year's Resolutions



Today we learned a two-minute trick that really puts food waste in perspective:

Next time you sit down to eat, take a minute to estimate how much the meal cost you. Then take another minute to think about the giant system that brought all of these wonderful ingredients to your plate:

- the months of ploughing, sowing and irrigation in the fields,
- the farmers out at all hours and in all weathers tending to their cattle,
- the extremely real dangers of heading offshore on a fishing boat,
- the grindingly hard work of picking, packing and processing,
- not to mention the cost to our planet in land use, fresh water and transport fuel.

Put that way, our meal suddenly seems very, very cheap at the price. And can you imagine throwing any of this laboriously produced food away? Wasting food that cost so much in time, effort and resources? Wow, that would be crazy! Finish the two minutes with a moment of gratitude and get eating. Tastes amazing, right?

Minds duly boggled, we've put our heads together to come up with ten pledges for cutting our food waste in 2019. Will you join us and add one or more to your New Year's resolutions list?

1. We resolve to eat what's in stock first

This January, the Greenredeem team are attempting the Back of the Cupboard Ingredient Challenge. To take part, all you need to do is dig out and start using up the older foodstuffs that have been hanging around the back of the kitchen cupboard for far too long. You know the ones!

Checking the cupboards, fridge and freezer and eating what's in stock before buying more food hopefully means no more unfortunate sour,, rotten, or stale surprises! Lower grocery bills won't hurt either!

2. We resolve to stack clever

Organise your food firstly according to its 'Use By' dates (these are mandatory, no eating afterwards) and secondly according to its Best Before dates (a suggestion for better eating). Put longer dates at the back, shorter dates at the front. Stacked this way, nothing gets 'lost' and meal planning starts with a quick glance. We plan to keep eating our way from front to back and, cross fingers, never encountering unexpectedly expired food again.

3. We resolve to start with a smaller portionl

t's far easier to use up leftovers that haven't been mixed up and pushed round on a plate, so this year we're resolving to begin our meals with smaller portions. We'll not starve – we can grab seconds if we're still hungry afterwards. No more piled-high platefuls!

4. We resolve to scrub, not peel

Much of the nutrition of carrots, potatoes, parsnips, ginger and the like is found in and just beneath their thin skins. We're going to make the most of these root veggies by switching the faff of peeling for a quick scrub instead.

5. We resolve to make friends with our freezers

Leftovers? Freeze 'em for another meal! Veggies about to turn? Freeze 'em for next week's curry! Bread slices getting stale? Freeze 'em for toasting! Not going to finish the milk, cheese and butter before you go on holiday? Freeze 'em for when you get back!

With a very few exceptions, most of the foods we eat day-to-day can be frozen for later. We're going to befriend our freezers this year and see how much further our food shopping can go.

6. We resolve to enjoy 'ugly' produce

In 2019 we've decided not to let the look of our fruit and veg get in the way of enjoying its freshness. Wonky produce deserves love too, especially as it's often cheaper than (boring!) standard sized.

7. We resolve to buy loose and only buy the amount that we need So many of our Back of the Cupboard Ingredient Challenge foodstuffs are leftover from a one-off recipe. When cooking something special and need less or more than the standard pack size of an uncommon ingredient, we've decided that in the first place we'll try to get the exact amount from a scoop-and-weigh store, zero waste shop or the supermarket's loose produce aisle.

8. We resolve to learn more leftovers recipes

Last year we got to grips with chick pea water meringues and sour milk pancakes – both of which sound dreadful and taste wonderful! This year we're going to dig into some proper leftover meat pies and melon rind pickling. Could you get more creative with your leftovers? Take a peek in the fridge and get googling for recipes!

9. We resolve to share the extra

Whether it's dropping off those tins at the food bank collection at the supermarket, popping some excess salad leaves in our local community fridge, advertising a few unwanted bits and bobs on OLIO's food sharing app or leaving a box of windfallen apples outside the front gate, we've made a mental note to share extra food whenever we can.

10. We resolve to stay grateful

We're thankful for all the people who work hard to put food on our plates. We appreciate this amazing planet for the resources that feed billions of us every day. And we feel very lucky that we and our families have enough to eat. Let's resolve to make the most of all of our food in 2019, cut out unnecessary food waste and stay grateful!

The Editor recently received this e-mail message, addressed to a valid personal e-mail address - the body is shown below. Looks very genuine and only needs a click on the 'UPDATE TVLicensing Now' text to take you onto a link that could introduce a virus or lead to a computer shutdown and ransom demand.

THE E-MAIL BEGINS

Information about your T V Licence
