

Dear Friends,

My Spiritual Director sometimes thinks I am a bit overzealous with my promises to God, promising things that I cannot possibly deliver and then getting upset with myself when I don't! Not something I would advise any of you to do. Consequently, when I saw him recently, he advised me, "choose some small self-denial in Lent so that every time you are tempted by it you can resist and remember why you are doing it - to remember what Jesus did for you". It was one of those occasions when I suddenly understood, at a deeper level, something I had done since childhood - that the point of self-denial, of fasting, during Lent was to allow the thought of Jesus' sacrifice for us to find a way to break into the routine of everyday existence.

#### What do you make of Lent?

Traditionally, it is a time for us to look at where we are in our relationship with God, and to try to move closer to him. Traditionally, that would be done in three ways- repentance, fasting and giving alms.

Repentance means being sorry for our sins, and turning back to Christ. Lent is a time to remember who we are - children of a loving God - to talk to him about the way we are journeying with him, to ask him to forgive us for our wrongdoings, and to ask him to give us strength to start afresh. Lent may also be a time when we want to talk with others about our journey with God, and how we might meet him more closely in prayer. If you would like to talk with me about this this Lent be in touch, and we can find some time.

Fasting can range from the small effort advised by my spiritual director to a bigger fast, but the purpose is the same, to help us to remember Jesus and what he has done for us. Giving alms, is giving to the poor. For us, either financially, or through the gift of our time.

I urge you to do something this Lent to remind yourself that you belong to Christ, that you are his disciple, and that he is your saviour.

The Ealing Trinity Circuit is running a Lent Course - "Cities of Sanctuary" to help us to focus this Lent. We are urged to consider with others how

our churches operate as places of sanctuary, and how we can do this even better. The course runs on Monday's from 11th March for five weeks. You can come either to Kingsdown Methodist Church at 10.30 am or to Greenford Methodist church at 7.30 pm. I am making a commitment to be at one of these each week to grow in my relationship with God, and to get to know the Circuit better. Can you commit to this too?

To end, another thing that my spiritual director often says to me at this time of year is "Happy Lent". The first time he said it to me I pulled him up on it, "is Lent meant to be a happy time?" He replied, "yes - of course-it's a time especially given to us to draw closer to Jesus - what could be better?"



So, tentatively, I wish you all a happy, Christ-filled, Lent!

## 6 March – ASH WEDNESDAY: mourning our sins

Lent begins with Ash Wednesday. But why 'Ash' Wednesday? The reason has to do with getting things right between you and God, and the tradition goes right back to the Old Testament.



In the Old Testament, the Israelites often sinned. When they finally came to their senses, and saw their evil ways as God saw them, they could do nothing but repent in sorrow. They mourned for the damage and evil they had done. As part of this repentance, they covered their heads with ashes. For the Israelites, putting ashes on your head, and even rending your clothes, was an outward sign of their heart-felt repentance and acknowledgement of sin. (See Genesis 18:27; 2 Samuel 13:19; Job 2:8, 30:19; Isaiah 58:5; Jeremiah 6:26; Jonah 3:6)

In the very early Christian Church, the yearly 'class' of penitents had ashes sprinkled over them at the beginning of Lent. They were turning to God for the first time, and mourning their sins. But soon many other Christians wanted to take part in the custom, and to do so at the very start of Lent. They heeded Joel's call to 'rend your hearts and not your garments' (Joel 2:12-19). Ash Wednesday became known as either the 'beginning of the fast' or 'the day of the ashes'.

The Log Cabin Charity is inclusive, welcoming mainstream siblings and local children, integrating everyone so that they socialise together, make new friends and form friendship groups, regardless of their abilities and disabilities.

Children come to After School Club, Holiday Playschemes, Saturday Club and Start2gether-Stay and Play sessions. The charity also offers a counselling service to young people aged 11+ and to parents and carers.

We are hoping that a representative from the charity will be able to attend, sell small gifts, distribute leaflets and answer questions about the charity.



"Standing Together" was launched at our head

office in Lower Marsh, Waterloo. As usual, the afternoon session, which we attended, was packed. The key address was given by Andrew Barton, and of course we were able to see the new resources for Christian Aid Week. CA's new global strategy was introduced and we explored its three key ideas - poverty, power and prophetic voice. This year during the Christian Aid Week, we shall be thinking of **SIERRA LEONE** and I shall be writing about the Ebola health crisis and **DROP THE DEBT** in the April Messenger.

But first, **LENT** when we shall be thinking and learning about families in the Philippines. LENT begins on Wednesday, 6 March when Eva and Lope invite you into their remote community on small islands in the Philippines. During Lent you will meet members of this community and read how Christian Aid's partner ICODE is helping them thrive. When typhoon Haiyan hit the area in 2013 the area was devastated. ICODE provided housing materials and training so that the fisher folk could use sustainable fishing methods. As you travel through Lent you will read many examples of help given by ICODE and we are invited to help this work to continue.

So, during Lent we shall be thinking of **CLIMATE CHANGE** and in Christian Aid Week **DROP THE DEBT**. Booklets (free) for Lent are now available 'RISE UP AGAINST CHANGE' - do ask for one.



# NEW FRAMEWORK of COMMITMENT



## The Methodist Church in Britain approves a new Framework of Commitment with All We Can

At today's Methodist Council meeting it was affirmed that All We Can, the Methodist relief and development agency, is an integral part of the Methodist Church's Calling and its commitment to One Mission, acting for the Church through work in international relief and development and in related public engagement.

The Framework of Commitment approved, and unanimously endorsed, today at Methodist Council expresses the relationship and commitments between the Methodist Church and All We Can, setting a context for ongoing and deeper collaboration in the future.

All We Can's CEO Graeme Hodge agreement, said of this Framework of Commitment between All We Can & The Methodist Church articulates our deep relationship joint and commitment to our calling and priorities. Today's missional commitment articulates our deepening engagement and collaborative efforts. This

collaboration is enabling us to develop new ways of working that will benefit those we serve – people living in some of the world's poorest communities around the world. Today's commitment reaffirms the vital role we play in serving the church as the Methodist relief and development agency.

"Today we re-assert our commitment to finding ways, together, to be good neighbours to those in need and to challenging and overcoming injustice through international relief and development.

All We Can is an organisation that was born out of Christian principles over 80 years ago and is an integral part of the Methodist family. We are proud of our heritage and are excited about continuing to find new ways together to engage the Church in practical responses to the challenges of global poverty in word and deed."

Doug Swanney, Connexional Secretary of the Methodist Church, commented, "Today's agreement is good news and will further strengthen the historic partnership between the Methodist Church and All We Can.

"The agreed framework provides us with a context for future collaborations that will motivate and inform our work without constraining innovative thinking. As our collaboration continues to grow, the Connexion will receive a sense that the Church and All We Can are working towards common goals."

In the Methodist Church's 'Future Together' Mission acknowledged that 'we live in a world broken by violence, injustice, poverty and greed.' The new Framework of Commitment between The Methodist Church and All We Can is a pledge by both organisations to collaborate in a way intended to motivate, inform and inspire unified responses to a world in need through innovation and a mutual understanding of the nature of mission

### Response to Penny Mordaunt - UK Aid

(Secretary of State for International Development)

We are deeply concerned by Penny Mordaunt's recent comments that suggest private sector investments should replace, rather than supplement, public aid for international development. While there is certainly a place for private investment this should never be at the cost of the commitments made to 0.7% of GNI, nor should it compromise the quality of UK Aid. The UK has been a world leader in its commitment to overseas development assistance. By meeting a global promise agreed in the United Nations every year since 2013, the UK has supported some of the world's most vulnerable people. The UK is well respected around the world for this contribution, it is critical that we continue this leadership and generosity in the coming years.

Understandably, many people have concerns about foreign aid when Britain faces so many domestic challenges. However, not only does it provide a platform for global cooperation, and in turn helps play a role in maintaining a safe and stable world, most importantly millions of individual lives have been saved or transformed through UK Aid. As a charity inspired by Christian principles, we believe that the UK has a moral responsibility to continue to provide 0.7% of GNI in aid. We are extremely concerned that the primary focus of this aid should be poverty alleviation that prioritises the protection of the environment, gender equality, health, education, life-saving humanitarian aid in times of crisis and most

importantly long-term sustainable solutions that build local capacity in some of the world's poorest communities.

While the world has seen unprecedented progress in tackling extreme poverty, there is still a long way to go in order to meet the Sustainable Development Goals by 2030. Our call is that the UK government do not step back from the global 0.7% aid target and continue to lead with compassion for the poorest and most marginalised in our world.

Mother Church, Mother Earth, Mother of the Gods – our human mothers – all of them have been part of the celebration of 'Mothering

Sunday' – as the fourth Sunday in Lent is affectionately known. It has been celebrated in the UK since at least the 16th century.

In Roman times, great festivals were held every Spring to honour Cybele, Mother of all the Gods. Other pagan festivals in honour of Mother Earth were also celebrated. With the arrival of Christianity, the festival became one honouring Mother Church.

During the Middle Ages, young people apprenticed to craftsmen or working as 'live-in' servants were allowed only one holiday a year on which to visit their families – which is how 'Mothering Sunday' got its name. This special day became a day of family rejoicing, and the Lenten fast was broken. In some places the day was called Simnel Day, because of the sweet cakes called simnel cakes traditionally eaten on that day.

In recent years the holiday has changed and in many ways now resembles the American Mothers' Day, with families going out to Sunday lunch and generally making a fuss of their mother on the day.

## Parkers in Northfields will shut in April

Originally in West Ealing Parkers has garnered a loyal following in Northfields Avenue over the years, with many regular customers refusing to buy bread, cakes and pastries anywhere else.

Owner and Director Brian Davis is retiring after nearly 50 years at the helm; the shop will be closing its doors for the last time on Saturday 20 April.

Brian says, "This decision is a result of many months of consideration and follows a life-affirming health scare I suffered in 2017.

"I am hugely grateful to both customers and staff for their loyalty over the years. I'm sure the final days will be emotional, and we will continue to sell the best hot cross buns in London until we close at 5:00pm on Easter Saturday."



The shop was first opened by Thomas Parker in 1913 followed by son John and his wife Monica (who continued working into her 90th year and sadly passed away in 2010).

Brian Davis joined the company in 1970, when there were six branches of Parkers across West London. To this day, Brian continues to drive the van and work alongside his colleagues in the bakery, in addition to the day to day administration of the business.

Brian, a qualified aircraft engineer from Bristol University, cites his engineering skills as an essential part of running the bakery and its machinery.

It's the superior quality bread, cakes, pastries and sandwiches – still made the traditional way – that has earned Parkers its exceptional reputation.

Brian says: "We're proud to have survived two world wars and several recessions by concentrating on quality products and personalised service."

## **Ealing Foodbank News Update**

The following is derived from an update recently circulated to volunteers who support the Ealing Foodbank.

Demand at the Ealing Foodbank's distribution centre cafés has grown significantly over the past year with increases of between 50% and 150% at each of the five existing cafés. Greenford, Southall and Acton are the busiest cafés, although Hanwell and Northolt have also seen significant extra demand. A new café will be opening at Ealing Green Church on Tuesday mornings from 26th February with Rev Sue Male as team leader. This means there will be a café open throughout the borough every day apart from Sunday.

The Foodbank is looking for volunteers to support the work of the Crisis Navigators at the cafés who can provide clients with advice on benefits, local services and support agencies. Someone to take over as Referral Partner co-ordinator is also required, liaising between the Foodbank and the agencies that distribute Foodbank vouchers to people facing food crisis.

## WATCH OUT THERE'S A POTATO ABOUT



The National Trust and Kew Gardens are now mailing their magazines in compostable wrappers. These wrappers are made from potato starch which along with other bioplastics made from plants will hopefully replace petroleum based plastics and help to save the planet.



The wrappers can be put onto the garden compost, used as liners in your waste food caddy or added to the Green Bin/Bags that the Council collect. Hopefully all other magazines will quickly follow.

Remember if you get a compostable bag do NOT put it in the Plastics recycling Blue bin. **Re-use or compost it.** 

#### **REMOVE LABELS**



Remember to take the labels off Plastic Bottles including Plastic Milk containers. Before you put them in the Blue Bin.

The labels are NOT recyclable and spoil the bottle and cap part that is. They are

usually stuck on in one place - a simple cut with knife or scissors and they come away. The labels on some milk containers just slip off.
