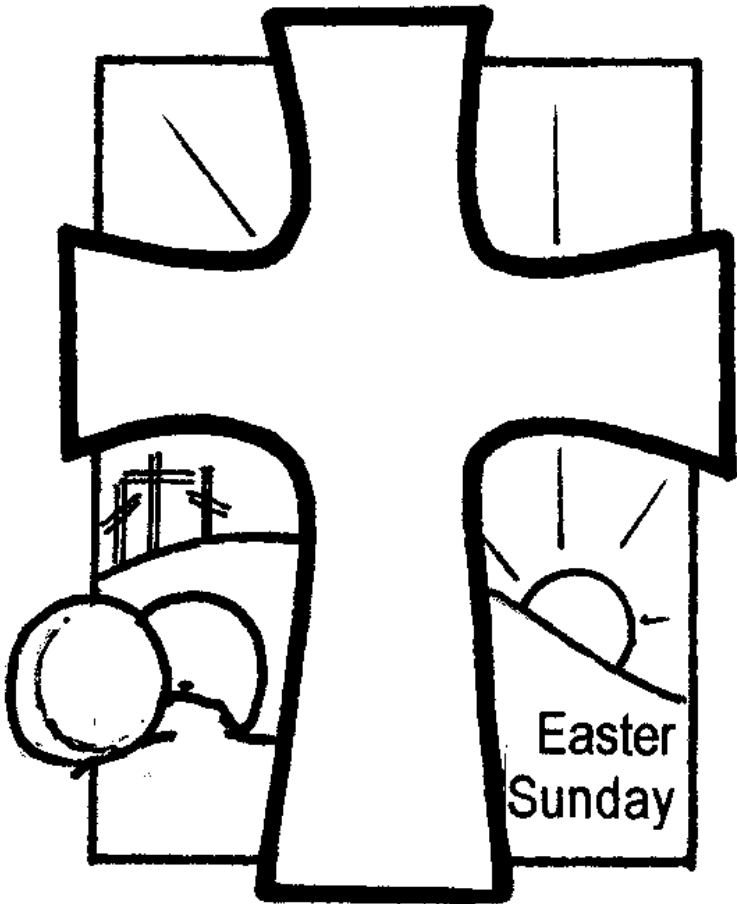

Dear Friends



At the time of writing, we are about half way through Lent. Easter still seems some way off, yet as we remember the Last Supper, the Passion and the Death of Jesus in the next few weeks, his Resurrection can never be far from our minds.

We watch the picture unfolding, in all its seeming tragedy, with the advantage of knowing what will happen .. of knowing that there is light, hope, the promise that we are loved and cherished, saved no matter what.

In this special time of Lent we draw closer to Jesus. We state again and again that our calling is to follow him. We much less frequently explore what it means to do so. Let's listen to how Jesus describes his mission, and then we will know what we are emulating.

¹⁴ Then Jesus, filled with the power of the Spirit, returned to Galilee, and a report about him spread through all the surrounding country.

¹⁵ He began to teach in their synagogues and was praised by everyone.

¹⁶ When he came to Nazareth, where he had been brought up, he went to the synagogue on the Sabbath day, as was his custom. He stood up to read,

¹⁷ and the scroll of the prophet Isaiah was given to him. He unrolled the scroll and found the place where it was written:

¹⁸ "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me,
because he has anointed me
to bring good news to the poor.

He has sent me to proclaim release to the captives
and recovery of sight to the blind,
to let the oppressed go free,

¹⁹ to proclaim the year of the Lord's favour."

²⁰ And he rolled up the scroll, gave it back to the attendant, and sat down. The eyes of all in the synagogue were fixed on him.

²¹ Then he began to say to them, "Today this scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing."

Luke 4:14-21

The purpose of our Lenten observance is to bring us closer to this vision. Our calling is to look for the things in ourselves, and in others that prevent us from living life to the full.

In some this will be physical:

- shelter for the homeless,
- food for the poor,
- operations for the blind,
- help for those who are oppressed by others.

In others it will be spiritual:

- a deeper look at The Bible for those who know it little, or not at all, or even those who know it so well it ceases to have an impact,
- an increased awareness of Jesus' way of doing things through love, to fulfil the law, but from where each person is at,
- freedom from guilt and addiction to sin, repentance,

and in all cases the simple knowledge that God is on our side no matter what, and that He draws us to him in his love.

Our Circuit Lent Course this year has been talking about our churches as places of sanctuary and welcome. In what ways do Ealing Green and Kingsdown give a welcome to all? It would be very interesting to try to draw up a list – to see the vastness of our contribution here, to see how we can be even more welcoming, showing God's love to all – even to see how different the part each of the churches plays is, and it is!

One way in which the Ealing Trinity Circuit is calling us to participate in showing God's love in a global situation, in literally helping to provide sanctuary for the poor and dispossessed is through a commitment to a Christian Aid "Community Partnership" project which aims to help families and young people who have fled from Syria due to the conflict there, and are currently living in Iraq, and Lebanon – countries which have opened their borders to them, but need help in finding the finances which will build the future for them. Christian Aid's partners are working in Lebanon

and Iraq to help people form small businesses, and to safely educate their children.

We have pledged as a circuit to raise £5000 for this project. Between them, Ealing Green and Kingsdown have been asked to raise £1300. This is a wonderful opportunity for the two churches to work together to help the poor of the world. We will learn more in weeks to come, but it is time to start thinking about what we can do as churches to raise this money, and how we can use the opportunity to work together and build new relationships too. Can we raise money, and improve our Bible Knowledge, and find time for prayer at the same time? Be creative, and please let me know your thoughts.



Why is this project ESPECIALLY worth us supporting? Because "Bread for the World" an American charity have pledged to increase our contribution six-fold. If (when) the Circuit succeeds in raising £5000 for the project, "Bread for the World" will add six times that, so Christian Aid will receive £35 000 for the project. I want to be part of this, don't you?

CHRISTIAN AID 2019 'DROP THE DEBT - SIERRA LEONE'

In May 1998 70,000 people to the streets in Birmingham to form a human chain - as part of the Jubilee Debt campaign we called on world leaders to cancel the debts of the poorest countries. Now, 21 years on, a new debt is looming. In our seven-day devotional for Christian Aid Week we shall read of Hannah and Tenneh and nurse Judith in Sierra Leone.

Sierra Leone is the world's most dangerous place to become a mum; ten women die every day from giving birth. Tenneh nearly lost her life - the health clinic she went to could not meet every need (the roof leaked, there were only two delivery beds, and it had no electricity).

In ~Sierra Leone communities are recovering from the EBOLA crisis of 2014 which claimed the lives of 4,000 people and killed 10% of healthcare workers. Today Sierra Leone lacks the funds to provide basic services. The government was given loans to help cope with the EBOLA crisis but is now expected to pay them back.

Your gifts this Christian Aid Week could help to build more health clinics, provide health training and improve hygiene, so mums and babies can live long and happy lives.

At the back of the devotional booklet you will find a postcard giving you the opportunity to call on the UK Government to drop Sierra Leone's debt, incurred by loans given to help fight the 2014 EBOLA crisis. You can post the card, or hand it to me to deliver (this will save the postage).

CYCLONE IDAI and MALAWI FLOODS

March 20, 2019

UN declare: “Worst ever disaster for Southern Africa”

Cyclone Idai has torn its way through Mozambique, Malawi and Zimbabwe. 2.6 million people have been affected across these three countries. This number is rising, as are the injury and death tolls.

Critical flooding in Malawi during the month of March caused widespread devastation with loss of life, displacement and entire harvests destroyed. The President announced a state of emergency on 8 March. Since the cyclone hit this week, the number of people affected has risen by more than 450,000 in Malawi.

The total number of people affected is now 922,900. This number will rise as heavy rainfall is expected to continue. People have been deeply affected in a number of ways.

Before the flooding, 3.3 million Malawians required food assistance due to failed harvests, this high level of food insecurity is what brought All We Can to work in Malawi. The number of communities now in desperate need of food has now been exacerbated because of this extreme weather destroying entire harvests. Not only have food supplies been eradicated, but whole livelihoods. 65% of Malawians rely on agriculture to earn a living – this includes the communities that All We Can work closely with.

Lack of sanitation and health facilities are also sparking angst across the country. Water sources have become contaminated with flood water. A lack of clean water has potentially life-threatening consequences with an increased risk of diseases such as cholera and malaria.

It is reported that over 125,382 people have been displaced from their homes. People with nowhere to go are being hosted in camps. The majority of the camps have inadequate shelter, and lack much needed sanitation and medical supplies.

All We Can launched a joint appeal with The Methodist Church on 15 March 2019 for those affected by the devastating floods. The need has now grown further in the aftermath of the cyclone.

All We Can already have local partners working in the worst affected areas of Malawi. All We Can's Humanitarian Aid Coordinator, Laura Cook, explains, "Given the extent of the need in Malawi and the strength of our partners who operate in some of the most affected areas, All We Can has decided to focus its relief effort there."

"We ask for your prayers for our brothers and sisters at this time. If you are able, we also ask that you give all you can to help. Your donation could supply lifesaving food to the worst affected communities in Malawi."

Palm Sunday



Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday, when the Church remembers how Jesus arrived at the gates of Jerusalem just a few days before the Passover was due to be held. He was the Messiah come to his own people in their capital city, and yet he came in humility, riding on a young donkey, not in triumph, riding on a war-horse.

As Jesus entered the city, the crowds gave him a rapturous welcome, throwing palm fronds into his path. They knew his reputation as a healer, and welcomed him. But sadly the welcome was short-lived and shallow, for Jerusalem would soon reject her Messiah, and put him to death. On this day churches worldwide will distribute little crosses made from palm fronds in memory of Jesus' arrival in Jerusalem.

Maunder Thursday

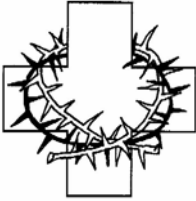


This day is famous for two things. The first is one of the final acts that Jesus did before his death: the washing of his own disciples' feet. (see *John 13*) Jesus washed his disciples' feet for a purpose: "A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another." His disciples were to love through service, not domination, of one another.

But Thursday was also important because it was on that night that Jesus first introduced the Lord's Supper, or what we nowadays call Holy Communion.

Jesus and his close friends had met in a secret upper room to share the Passover meal together – for the last time. And there Jesus transformed the Passover into the Lord's Supper, saying, 'this is my body' and 'this is my blood' as he, the Lamb of God, prepared to die for the sins of the whole world. John's gospel makes it clear that the Last Supper took place the evening BEFORE the regular Passover meal, and that later Jesus died at the same time that the Passover lambs were killed.

Good Friday



The day on which Jesus died on the cross. He was crucified at 9am in the morning, and died six hours later, at 3pm. It is the most solemn day in the Christian year, and is widely marked by the removal of all decorations from churches. In Lutheran churches, the day was marked by the reading of the passion narrative in a gospel, a practice which lies behind the 'passions' composed by Johann Sebastian Bach (1685 – 1750).

Both the St Matthew Passion and the St John Passion have their origins in this observance of Good Friday.

Easter is the most joyful day of the year for Christians

Christ has died for our sins. We are forgiven. Christ has risen! We are redeemed! We can look forward to an eternity in His joy! Hallelujah!

The Good News of Jesus Christ is a message so simple that you can explain it to someone in a few minutes. It is so profound that for the rest of their lives they will still be 'growing' in their Christian walk with God.

Why does the date move around so much? Because the date of Passover moves around, and according to the biblical account, Easter is tied to the Passover. Passover celebrates the Israelites' exodus from Egypt and it lasts for seven days, from the middle of the Hebrew month of Nisan, which equates to late March or early April.

Sir Isaac Newton was one of the first to use the Hebrew lunar calendar to come up with firm dates for Good Friday: Friday 7 April 30 AD or Friday 3 April, 33 AD, with Easter Day falling two days later. Modern scholars continue to think these the most likely.

JOHN 13:34 "A new commandment I give you, love one another as I have
loved you, so you must love one another' reminding us of the hymn "A
new commandment I give unto you".

PHILIPPIANS 3:13 "One thing I do forgetting what is behind and straining
towards what is ahead" reminding us of the hymn, "One more step along
the world I go....from the old things to the new...."

1st CORINTHIANS 13;13 "These three remain - Faith, Hope and Love. But
the greatest of these is Love" reminding us of the words "God is Love so
Love for ever o'er the universe must reign" in the hymn "God is Love"

Have you noticed the consistency of the number "13" in all the verses so
I conclude with REVELATION 22:13 where Jesus says "I am the Alpha and
Omega - the First and the last, the Beginning and the End".

Thank you that, because Jesus is alive, life has meaning and purpose.

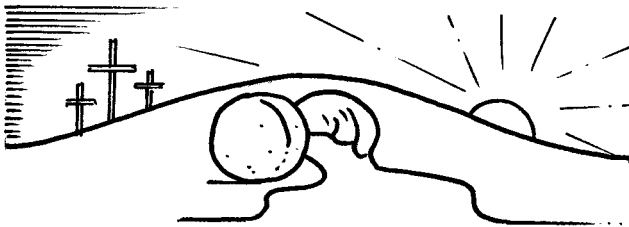
When we don't understand why some things happen, when life is

One Body with Many Parts

12 Christ is like a single body, which has many parts; it is still one body, even though it is made up of different parts. 13 In the same way, all of us, whether Jews or Gentiles, whether slaves or free, have been baptized into the one body by the same Spirit, and we have all been given the one Spirit to drink.

14 For the body itself is not made up of only one part, but of many parts. 15 If the foot were to say, "Because I am not a hand, I don't belong to the body," that would not keep it from being a part of the body. 16 And if the ear were to say, "Because I am not an eye, I don't belong to the body," that would not keep it from being a part of the body. 17 If the whole body were just an eye, how could it hear? And if it were only an ear, how could it smell? 18 As it is, however, God put every different part in the body just as he wanted it to be. 19 There would not be a body if it were all only one part! 20 As it is, there are many parts but one body.

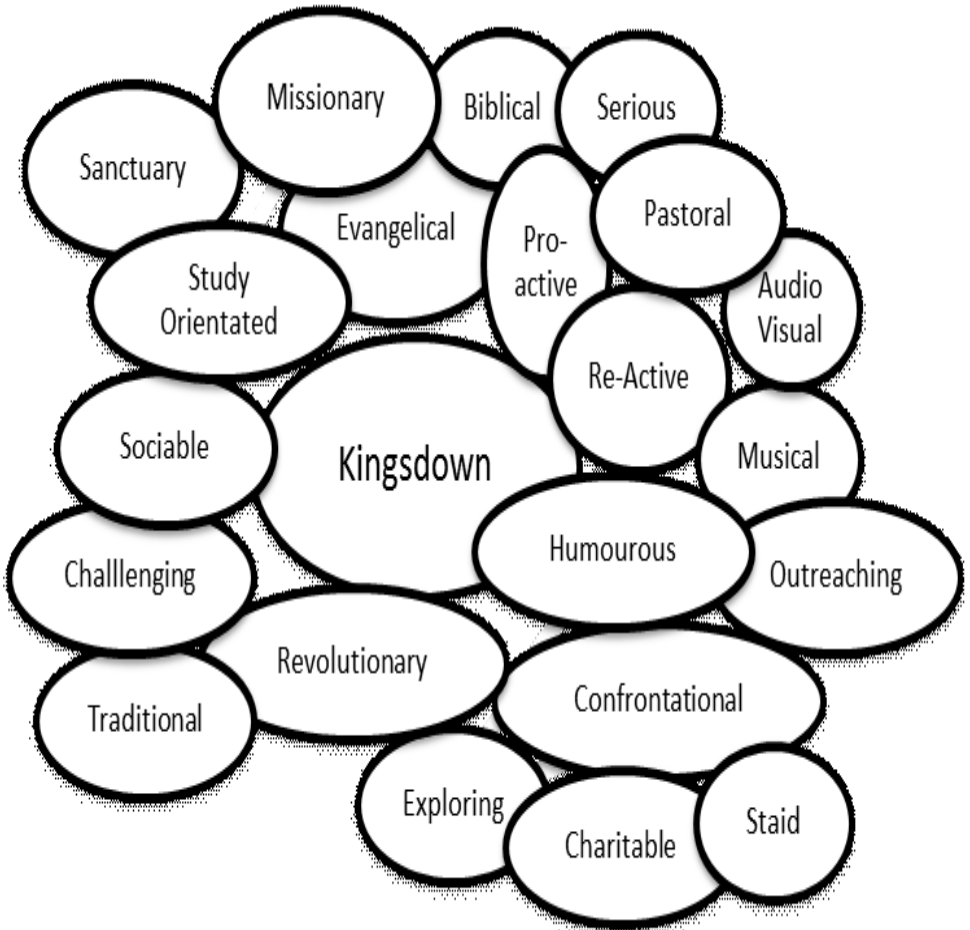
21 So then, the eye cannot say to the hand, "I don't need you!" Nor can the head say to the feet, "Well, I don't need you!" 22 On the contrary, we cannot do without the parts of the body that seem to be weaker; 23 and those parts that we think aren't worth very much are the ones which we treat with greater care; while the parts of the body which don't look very nice are treated with special modesty, 24 which the more beautiful parts do not need. God himself has put the body together in such a way as to give greater honor to those parts that need it. 25 And so there is no division in the body, but all its different parts have the same concern for one another. 26 If one part of the body suffers, all the other parts suffer with it; if one part is praised, all the other parts share its happiness.

27 All of you are Christ's body, and each one is a part of it.

Dental Charges go up on April 1st



Charges for NHS dental services in England are set to rise by five per cent on April 1.

It might not seem like much, but the more intensive the treatment, the more you will see the costs rise.

For example, while a basic check-up will increase by £1.10, from £21.60 to £22.70, procedures such as root canals and removing teeth, will go up £3, from £59.10 to £62.10.

And more complicated procedures, such as crowns and dentures, will be rising by £12.80, from £256.50 to £269.30.

Imperial College London are working to deliver a clinical research study to assess the impact of a DNA-based diet on the risk of developing type 2 diabetes. The **ASPIRE-DNA** clinical trial is the first research project of Nudgeomics which aims to investigate how combining DNA-based dietary guidelines could be effective in improving an individual's metabolic health. If successful, this technology could be a low-cost, scalable preventative technique in mitigating the risk of type 2 diabetes in people with pre-diabetes.

The study based at Hammersmith Hospital needs volunteers. If you are eligible, you can participate in a trial assessing the impact of personalised diet recommendations based on your genes, provided by the latest DnaNudge technology.
