Dear Friends



You will remember that when I first arrived with you - 10 whole months ago now - I told you that I was interested in helping the churches to build up ecumenical and interfaith relationships. We have so much to learn (and to teach) about

God, about the world, about others, and about ourselves from our interactions with others that "relationship" simply has to be what we are all here for - relationships with others, and of course relationship with God - Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

So, this month my letter is about relationships with other Christians, and people of different faiths.

I have begun to attend the ecumenical and interfaith visits organised by "Christians Together in Central Ealing". Some of you come too I know and have far more experience of these visits than I currently do! It is important that we learn about one another in order to break down barriers. The next visit to the Arya Samaj Hindu temple on Argyle Road, will take place in the autumn (unfortunately the July date advertised had to be changed). I will pass details to you when I have them, and certainly hope to be there.

The best ecumenical conversation and work I am involved in at present is the "Foodbank Café" on Tuesday mornings at Ealing Green. This is a truly ecumenical group doing significant and worthwhile work with the community.

As you know I have also been trying to build interfaith relationships. I have been meeting with Navleen, a member of the Sikh faith based at the Gurdwara in Southall. We would like to bring a small group of Sikh and Methodist women together. We envision that they will be women who enjoy and could teach one another crafts. The aim simply to get to know one another, and thus to cross the boundaries that our cultural differences can sometimes cause.

If you are a woman of any age who loves craft and would value the challenge of being part of this, please be in touch. If you know somebody else who fits the bill, please talk to them about it. Please help me to build this group since I do not yet know who the "crafty" members of our churches are - way out of my own comfort zone, so you should also get some amusement from my efforts: The initial meeting will take place over lunch on 5 Sept. please let me know if you are interested.

The second Interfaith connection I have made for us is with the "Ealing Liberal Synagogue". This is particularly appealing, since one member at Kingsdown has a special relationship with the Synagogue already - in that she is married to one of its members.

The Synagogue has invited us to their harvest celebration - to Sukkah on Saturday 12 October at 11 AM – 1PM. The tradition here is to build and decorate booths – Sukkah . We will then meet for a time of learning from one another, and food. Numbers for this are limited. Please therefore let me know as soon as possible if you would like to come.



If any of you have any other links with faith communities, Christian and other, that we could explore then talk to me.

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Action for Children

The book fair in aid of Action for Children was at Kingsdown on Saturday July 6th.

This is the 150th anniversary for the Methodist charity AFC which focuses on children's and young people's welfare in the UK.



It was in 1869 that the Reverend Thomas Bowman Stephenson, moved by the plight of children sleeping rough on the streets of London, opened the first home, a renovated stable in Church Street, Waterloo, the first two boys, Fred and George being admitted on July 9th. The home later moved to Lambeth in 1871 and girls were admitted.

The homes were divided into small family units run by 'house mothers' and 'house fathers', which was in marked contrast to the large institutions and workhouses common at this time.

By 1908 the charity had grown to become the National Children's Home and Orphanage. It became an adoption agency in 1926.In 1994 the name changed to NCH Action for Children and in September 2008 Action for Children. This reflected a shift away from providing children's homes to a wider range of services.

AFC works in partnership with statutory bodies to deliver services in family support, disability, children in care, support for young people and education. it is also involved in research, campaigning and fundraising. For further information see **www.actionforchildren.org.uk**

Build - A - Bog Appeal

Have you ever thought about what your life would be like without a toilet?

For families like Ratidzo's and 2.3 billion people around the world, they don't have to imagine – life without a toilet is their daily reality.

This is the daily reality faced by Ratidzo, a grandmother and a widow living with her family in rural Zimbabwe. She lives with her children and grandchildren. The youngest and most vulnerable is her grandson Tadiwa, who is just four years old.

But there is hope, a simple toilet and education about good sanitation practices, like washing hands using a tippy-tap, could help prevent the spread of deadly diarrhoeal diseases like cholera.

President of Conference Challenge for Offsetting Carbon Footprint

The President and Vice-President of the Methodist Conference are inviting every church to offset their carbon omissions by giving to All We Can.

Climate change is affecting many of the communities where All We Can is working, rains and flooding destroy harvests and climate disasters put lives, livelihoods and infrastructure at risk.

One of the ways to tackle climate change is by reducing / offsetting our



own carbon footprint. So we are delighted that the incoming President and Vice-President of Methodist Conference – Rev Dr Barbara Glasson and Professor Clive Marsh – are committed to this action. When Barbara and Clive travel over the year visiting churches across the Connexion, they will be asking those they visit to offset their travel by making a donation to All We Can.

Every donation will go to our work with local communities in countries like Ethiopia to plant trees that will offset the carbon emissions of their travel. It costs around 5p a mile to offset the carbon emissions of an average car journey in the UK.

When Barbara or Clive come to visit your Church, Circuit or District this year, donate 5p per mile to tackle climate change and work towards the vision of being a more carbon-neutral church.

From the Annual General Meeting and the Church Council

The last couple of months have seen the Annual General Church Meeting and a meeting of the Church Council.

The timing of the former made it rather difficult to provide a report for the last edition of the Messenger so this note seeks to redress that with some of the main highlights and points.

During the meeting Rev Sue Male gave some reflections on the past year at Kingsdown. She started by outlining the things that had really impressed her:

- The Night Shelter as she felt this was 'proper' church work, ie reaching out in a structured way.
- The Christmas social this had been a good opportunity to get to know people
- The Festival of Nativities she had really enjoyed this and was impressed by the numbers of children who had visited the Festival and their interest in it. She wondered, however if the church was still enjoying it.

- The Christmas services the Junior Church nativity was the best she had seen.
- Good Friday the Taizé style service had been a moment of quiet.

However, Sue noted that Kingsdown seems to struggle with leadership. In particular she had noticed that people could often be very critical of those in leadership and suggested at times people were expecting too much. She added that we need to value what people can do rather than dwell on whether things were being done 'properly'. In addition, sometimes she felt we think things are difficult when they are not.

The Circuit Lent series at Kingsdown had not been well attended although a number of people from Kingsdown had joined the group. Her Husband, Phil Male would be organising a Bible Study group at her manse based around an overview of the Bible. In addition, she will be organising a preaching series around Harvest with Phil.

For the future, Sue was trying establish links with the Ealing Liberal Synagogue who would like to invite us to their Harvest service. This would give an opportunity to learn more about them and to build a relationship with them.

At the Church Council meeting on 19th June, Sue was able to report that the synagogue has invited people from Kingsdown and Ealing Green to join their harvest celebration on 12th October at 12.00pm. The synagogue is in Lynton Avenue W13.

Sue outlined the Circuit's involvement in supporting Christian Aid's Iraq and Lebanon project between now and the end of 2020. The Circuit had been asked to raise $\pounds 5,000$ which would be matched by a US charity to produce a total of $\pounds 30,000$. Kingsdown and Ealing Green had been asked to raise $\pounds 1,300$ between them.

She thought it would be good if the two churches could use this as an opportunity to work together to raise that amount. Sue Barton, Jill Richardson and Kath Jarrett said they would be interested in forming a group with Ealing Green.

She added that she had good relations with the Harrow Apollo Choir who had offered Sunday 14th June 2020 for a fund-raising concert at Ealing Green. There was also the possibility of a Circuit Quiz with a speaker to talk about the project. Sue said she was developing a project with a group of Sikh women from one of the Southall Gurdwaras.

The idea is that Sikh and Methodist women would get together to work on something creative as a way of getting to know each other, and each other's faith better. There will be a meeting over lunch at a vegetarian restaurant in Southall (details to be announced) on 15th September. The invitation would be extended to women around the Circuit. If you are interested, please speak to Sue Male.

This year sees the 60th anniversary of the amalgamation of the former West Ealing Methodist Church with the Moullin Memorial Methodist Church to form Kingsdown Methodist Church and the reopening of the refurbished and restructured building at Kingsdown.

How we celebrate this was discussed at both the annual meeting and the following Church Council meeting. Although the official re-opening happened in August 1959, we will celebrate the anniversary on 8th December. There will be a 'bring & share' lunch following the morning service. Sue Male will invite the various users of our building to join us and members are asked to invite any past members that they are in contact with.

The 60^{th} anniversary celebration will coincide with the Festival of Nativities and Sue Male will be inviting local schools to come to see the festival during the following week (9th - 15th December).

Ever wondered what charity is? It is silence - when your words would hurt. It is patience - when your neighbour is curt. It is deafness - when a scandal flows. It is thoughtfulness - for others' woes. It is promptness - when duty calls. It is courage - when misfortune falls.

Pilgrim's Progress

After the Bible, John Bunyan's wonderful Christian allegory, the Pilgrim's Progress, is one of the most celebrated and widely-read books in the English language. It has been translated into more than one hundred languages around the world and keeps its place as a Christian classic.

Names of people and places from its pages have been commonplace wherever English is spoken. We need only recall Mr Great-Heart, Mr Valiant-for-Truth, Giant Despair, Madame Bubble, the Slough of Despond, Vanity Fair, the Delectable Mountains, the Hill Difficulty and the Celestial City.

Bunyan was born on 28 November 1628, at Elstow, near Bedford, England, of a poor family. He had little formal education and his father taught him to

time the Bible became the great inspiration of his life. He wrote more than fifty books on Christianity. A Baptist by conviction, he had little time for the Established Church

Bunyan became a popular preacher, but because of his opposition to the Established Church and because he did not have a Church of England preaching licence, he was imprisoned in 1661. It was in prison that he wrote Pilgrim's Progress. It was not only Bunyan's greatest book but was destined to become one of the most popular Christian books in the world.

Pilgrim's Progress is an allegory, using the names of people and places from the Bible to teach spiritual lessons. The vivid and unforgettable imagery in the Pilgrim's Progress covers the whole Christian gospel from sin and condemnation all the way through faith, repentance, grace, justification, sanctification, and perseverance to heaven itself.

Bunyan died on 31st August 1688. His portrayal of the death of Mr Valiant For Truth is Bunyan at his allegorical best. This brave old soldier of Jesus Christ had received his summons to 'go home.' Calling his friends together he says, 'My sword I give to him who shall succeed me in my pilgrimage ... My marks and scars I carry with me, to be a witness for me, that I have fought His battles, Who will now be my rewarder.' ... So he passed over, and all the trumpets sounded for him on the other side...'

Too High a Price?

In June of this year we commemorated the 75th Anniversary of the D-Day landings in the knowledge that many of the veterans would not see another major celebration of that remarkable event. That brought an added poignancy to the proceedings.

I'm sure that, like me, you were touched by what many of the veterans had to say. 'We're not the heroes,' they said, 'the heroes are those who died or were terribly injured. We survived and have had another 70 years. We are not the heroes.'

No one watching the TV coverage or reading the media could fail to be

Are we willing to pay the price? the stories of sacrifice to tell, a generation of whom sacrifice and I was asked recently, present generation

would respond in the same way, with such self-sacrifice?'

I guess no-one can answer that question, but it did make me think about the costly call to discipleship that is at the heart of Christianity. We follow one who freely laid down His life to save us from our sin. 'No-one takes my life from me,' Jesus said, 'but I lay it down of my own accord.' (John 10:18). The Saviour calls us to a similar costly obedience: 'Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross and follow Me.' (Mark 8:34)

Sacrifice is central to Christian devotion. We may not be asked to literally lay down our lives (although some are in other parts of the world) but we are asked to give God priority in our lives and to put His will before our own. This too can be very challenging and costly. Are we willing to pay the price?

Calming of the Storm

One of the most famous stories about Jesus is the calming of the storm (Luke 8:22-25). Of course, anyone could say that the wind stopped suddenly of its own accord, but the disciples were not fooled. They had seen a number of these 'coincidences' in Jesus' ministry, and they weren't about to ignore this one. Jesus had calmed the waves with only His words. Wasn't this an act of God? Who else could be in complete control of creation?

Jesus dealt graciously with the very pressing and practical issue of the raging storm before He did a bit of teaching, asking His followers "Where is your faith?" It's not surprising that they were scared, given the circumstances, but clearly Jesus expected better of them. He had already been teaching them for some time, and clearly knew they were ready to trust Him.

In similar circumstances, Christians often do several things in quick succession. We start by panicking and being afraid. After a while we might remember what we know about God's character and pray for help, trusting that whatever happens He will help us to handle it. Most often, we don't get the storm-calming effect when we ask for it, but battling on with faith and God's help is much easier than trying to keep going in a panic.

'Peace' in this kind of situation is a very active holding on to what we know about God. The difference between trusting and not trusting can be like night and day in terms of stress levels. I have found that it can make the difference between unmanageable stress and something that stretches me and teaches me something new.

Knowing some science can help us to trust God. A Being who created the whole universe, sustaining the wonderfully creative processes that produced diverse life on earth, must be both extremely powerful and extremely wise. The God who can both calm the waves and walk on them must be in complete control of the things He made.

When this knowledge goes hand in hand with experience of God's intimate love for us and care for us in every situation that we find ourselves in, I am reassured that He's got things in hand. I will always need help from others to pray faithfully in stormy situations, but hopefully I've seen enough now not to panic for too long.

Time (and my closest friends) will tell!

How do you spot fake news?

Here are some tips which may prove useful.

What is the source? Have a good look at the website where you found it, including the About Us section. Is it really a news site? Are other stories from this site believable? Can you find this story and the other stories on the site anywhere else?

What is the domain name? If it is similar to a respected website, that is a bad sign. Also beware of any domain names that are strange, or very long.

Who wrote the story? Does the website provide any names? Do a web search on these people. Are they really journalists?

How current is the stoty? Sometimes very old, out of date stories get recycled.

Do your own research. If the story claims that something specific happened somewhere, try and find that same story on other websites. If the story is just on that one website, be careful! If in doubt, try approaching an organisation you trust that deals in that same area.

Beware social media. Anyone could have written it.

Finally, if you are left in any doubt, then **doubt!**

Plastic, Plastic, Everywhere

Did you know that you are eating plastic? On average, each one of us now ingests about five grams of plastic each week – or the equivalent of eating a credit card.

Such is the rather startling news from WWF (World Wide Fund for Nature). Research at the University of Newcastle in Australia has found that we are consuming up to 102,000 tiny pieces of plastic less than 1mm – around 250 grams – each year. Nearly 90 per cent of that is coming from our water, both bottled and tap. Other foods with high plastic levels are shellfish, beer and salt.



Alec Taylor, Head of Marine Policy at WWF, said, "Plastic is polluting our planet... and now we know it's also polluting our own bodies."

The long-term effects of plastic ingestion on the human body are not yet known. In the meantime, Britain has taken 15 billion plastic bags out of circulation, and recently banned microbeads in cosmetics.

The Government is also considering a deposit return scheme for plastic bottles. At present, Britons use 7.7 billion single-use plastic water bottles a year, less than half of which are recycled. This means that 16 million bottles are binned every day in the UK.

NB Glastonbury Festival banned the sale of Plastic Bottles of Water and Drinks saved using over a Million bottles. Water Stations across the site were provided so people could refill their own containers. Look at the Raw Foundation web site **http://rawfoundation.org** for more information about avoiding using plastic.
